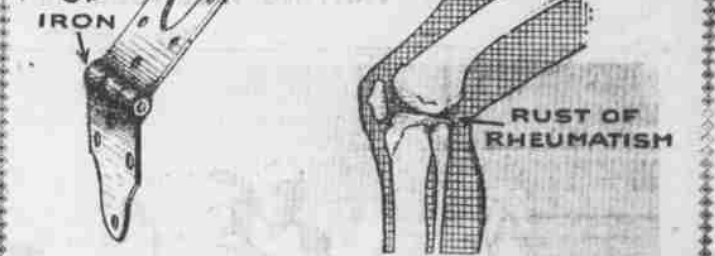

total imports were 167, 289 barrels and in 1915 only 98,499 barrels. This Canadian wheat and flour is being received through every customs office with 114,000 bushels of wheat, districts on the northern border from the Atlantic to the Pacific, Buffalo, leading in September with 285,119 bushels and 51,536 barrels of flour, followed by Duluth, Minnesota, and Superior, Wisconsin, with 223,982 bu-

shels of wheat and 15,761 barrels of flour. Michigan with 138,881 bushels of wheat and 1,359 barrels of flour, with 114,000 bushels of wheat, Minnesota with 12,145 bushels of wheat, and New York, Rochester, Vermont, Dakota, Montana, and Washington with varying amounts. There is also a noticeable movement of Canadian flour to the West Coast.
