du agreed upon of \$1,151,400,000, America's gold certificate stock on hand November 1 stood at \$344,500,000, an increase of \$172,500,000 in the past ten months.

The grand total of estimated receipts for the fiscal year of 1918 is \$12,530,222,800.

"Expenditures for the civil establishment total \$1,281,124,100. "War risk insurance costs are estimated at \$125,000,000 while the shipping board requires \$301,025,000 and the council of national defense \$500,000,000.

"The war department, including \$1,000,000,000 for war purposes, requires \$3,822,425,000; rivers and harbors, \$23,500,000 while the navy establishment requires a total of \$1,466,150,000 including \$1,300,000,000 for war purposes, and \$166,000,000 for a new building program.

"For the fiscal year 1919 the grand total estimated receipts are \$1,175,000,000, while the disbursements include:
