\$50 THRIFT PRIZE IS MUCH SOUGHT AFTER

COMING TEACHERS' CONVENTION WILL DISCUSS WAYS AND MEANS.

All Children of State to Be Interested; Prize Donated by Bankers' Association at Meeting in Marshfield Last Summer.

At the coming State Teachers' convention in Portland, December 26-29, much thought will be given to the subject of the \$50 prize which was offered last June by the Oregon Bankers' Association to the county whose schools evidence the best showing in the promotion of thrift.

The prize of \$50 was donated by the Bankers' Association at a meeting last summer in Marshfield. A Gift committee of the Oregon Bankers' Association composed of W. E. Taylor, cashier of the Benton County Bank of Prineville; H. Hirschberger, president of the Independence National Bank of Independence; A. C. Schmidt, vice president of the First Savings Bank of Albany; and Dean J. A. Howell of the Oregon Agricultural College, was appointed to devise means for awarding the prize.

Through Dean Howell the State Teachers' Association's cooperation was enlisted and plans laid for interesting every county superintendent in the state.

During the teachers' convention the details will be set before the teachers in anticipation of interesting all the children in Oregon. A score card will be sent to each school in the state, through the county superintendents, on which is to be reported the enrollment of the county, and the following questions are to be used as a basis for making the award.

The Score Card Is As Follows.

1. Total school enrollment.
2. How many pupils in the schools of your county have saved and deposited in a bank an average of ten cents a week during the school year?
3. How many pupils have devoted an average of three hours a week to home industry, including food production or preparation, such as gardening, mother raising, pig raising, fruit packing, cooking, canning, sewing or embroidery?
4. How many pupils have prepared, during the school year, written work on thrift and submitted same to their teachers county superintendent, or to some newspaper for publication?
5. How many persons have participated in Thrift programs, including readings, recitations, debates or addresses, conducted by the schools of your county during the school year?

Ratio Is Basis.

From the score cards the ratio of pupils to the number of pupils in each county will be determined and the award made on this basis. The Teachers' Association has named a committee to handle the campaign. The committee is composed of E. J. Toomey, superintendent of schools at Oregon City; Joseph H. Albert, banker, Salem; J. A. Howell, dean of the Oregon Agricultural College; Oregon Agricultural College; Dean T. Boney, superintendent of schools in Wasco county; L. L. Goodrich, banker, Eugene; G. W. McCoy, banker, Ashland; Mrs. Gertrude Orth, teacher, Portland public schools; A. C. Strauss, superintendent of schools, Baker; and T. H. West, assistant cashier, Lead & Titon bank, Portland.

In addition to the cooperation of the Oregon State Bankers' Association H. C. Scamner, state club leader of the United States department of agriculture and Oregon agricultural college, cooperate with the bank and state club work with the movement which will not only create an added interest in the club work carried on by the girls and boys of the state, but will give them credit on the thrift score card for their work done in their club activities.

With our country becoming more and more dependent in the war, thrift stands out one of the essential qualifications necessary to lead our arms to victory.

Realizing that the children in the homes form a most important factor in the morale of our every day life, the Bankers' Association considered the matter of setting the thrift movement properly before them one of the vital points in the entire thrift campaign.

If every child in the state of Oregon could be interested to the extent of saving at least one dime a week during the year, it is thought that a foundation would be laid which would inevitably lead to the more important features of thrift, such as home preparations of food, conservation and talking, and even writing on the subject. Thoughtful saving and careful expenditure constitute the basis upon which this award will be made.

That this campaign has aroused the patriotic spirit of many of the county schools in Oregon is proved by numerous letters expressive of a desire to cooperate, which have been received by Chairman Toomey of the State Teachers' Thrift Committee.
