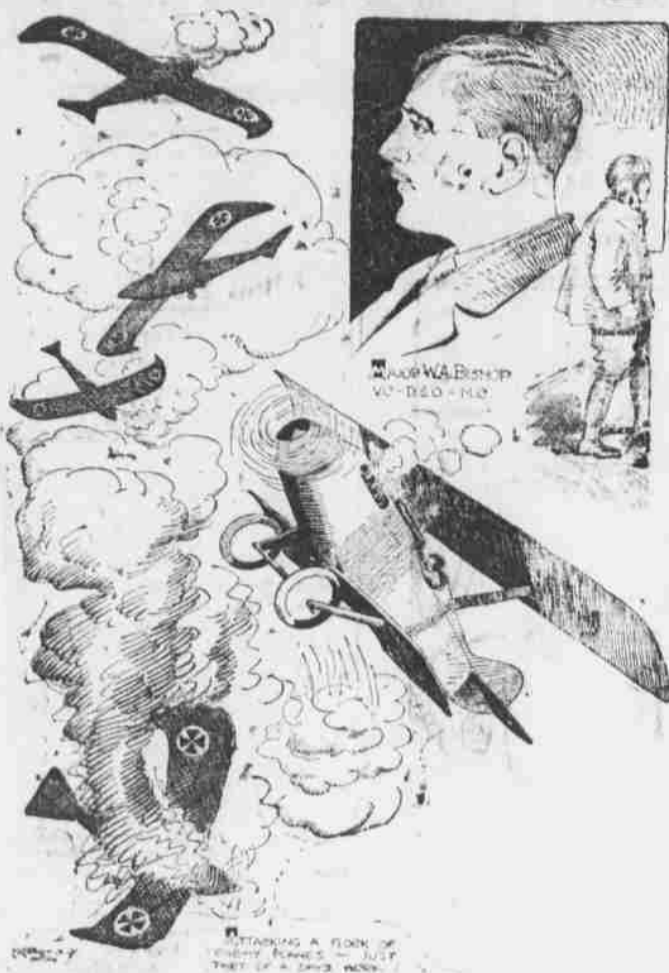

Melvin Denning made a trip to La Grande Wednesday.

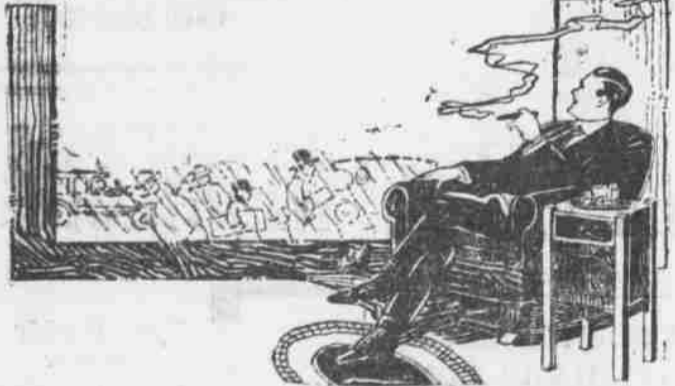
