LIEUTENANT HELD FOR HITTING PRVT. SPARTANBURG OFFICER SAID TO HAVE QUARRELED WITH SUBORDINATE.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Dec. 18.—Lieut. Harold Le Roy Whitney of Battery B, 104th Field Artillery, is under arrest at Camp Wadsworth charged with having struck Private Mendill of the same command, and will face an investigation by court martial.

It is understood that Lieut. Whitney and Mendill became involved in a quarrel. Whitney saw service on the border as a private in 104th Field Artillery and was promoted to Lieutenant soon after his return.
