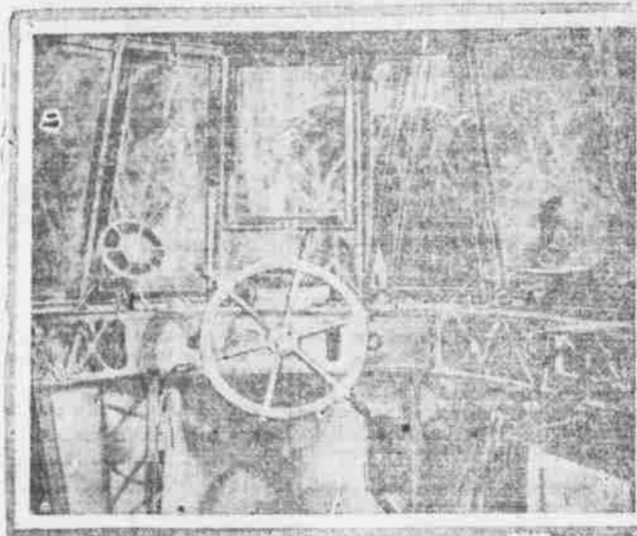
**Hatfield-McCoy Feud Is On In Virginia**

### IN COMMANDERS CABIN OF A ZEPPELIN



A photograph of extreme interest showing details of the Zeppelin "L 19," which was brought down practically intact in France, near Bourdeaux-Haine, after the raid on London last month. The airship has been dismantled by French aeronautical experts, who are in possession of all of the secrets of her mechanism.

A particularly interesting feature is the construction of her forward car containing the commander's cabin, the brain of the monster, with its navigating controls and bomb-dropping gear, behind that a wireless cabin, and in the after part a large motor and propeller. The forward part was divided from the after part by sound-proof partition, so that the vibration of the motor should not affect the navigating and wireless apparatus.

### WOMEN ADOPT TEN WAR COMMANDMENTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—Ten war commandments for the women of America were proposed last night by the women's committee of the Council of National Defense, of which Dr. Anna Howard Shaw is chairman, with the suggestion that they be made the basis for a New Year's resolution. Here is the new decalogue:

- "Do not chatter. Keep to yourself the news you hear.
- "Do not listen to alarmists or slanders.
- "Be moderate in your spending. Refrain lavishly in gifts nor sordid in your economies.
- "Encourage national industries, avoiding imported ones.
- "Do not look upon the departures for the front of those dear to you as an abandonment. Be with them constantly in thought, as they are with you, particularly in the hour of danger.
- "Do not complain of the difficulties, annoyances and privations caused by the war.
- "Multiply your activities in your home as well as outside.
- "Exhibit day by day and hour by hour the same courage a man shows upon the field of battle.
- "No matter how long the struggle lasts, await victory with strength and patience.
- "If you are stricken in your dearest affections, bear your sorrow nobly; that your tears may be worthy of the hero whose death you mourn."

### Bank President Kills His Cashier in Duel

PEORIA, Ill., Dec. 24.—Bernie M. Mead, cashier of the State & Trust & Savings Bank of Peoria, was shot and killed by Edward A. Strause, president of the bank, in a revolver duel in the bank building at noon today.

Business jealousy over the honor of being named president of the bank at a meeting scheduled for next week is believed to have been at the bottom of the killing.

Mead was a heavy stockholder in the bank and so is Strause. They had been bitter feeling between the men for the last two months over control of the stock.

Early rumors that another man was involved have not been verified. Strause the only living witness to the death struggle, has made no statement.

At noon pedestrians hearing loud talking in the bank, stopped and gathered about the windows. A few minutes later the crowd scattered when three shots were fired. The police were called.
