Carolina Tin Deposits.

The United States Geological Survey, department of the interior, has recently issued a report on the tin resources of the Kings Mountain district, North Carolina and South Carolina. The presence of cassiterite, oxide of tin, at many places in the district has led to much prospecting and attempts at mining. In at least one place—the Ross mine, near Gaffney—placer mining was temporarily profitable. Practically all the work on the lodes, which are pegmatite dikes carrying cassiterite, has been done at a loss, but the results of this work have not been sufficiently conclusive to prove or disprove the value of some of the deposits.
