**\$3,000,000,000 U. S. BALANCE.**

Our Foreign Trade Stands That Much in Our Favor.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—America's balance of trade approximated \$3,000,000,000 at the close of November, according to figures issued today by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. It was an increase of \$141,000,000 over the same period last year.

During November export restrictions caused a substantial decrease in foreign trade.

During the eleven months ended with November, gold amounted to \$325,000,000 and exports to \$287,000,000, leaving an excess of imports of \$168,000,000 in 1917 against \$329,000,000 in 1916.

Silver imports during the eleven months amounted to \$47,000,000 against \$29,000,000 a year ago. Exports were valued at \$71,000,000 in 1917 and \$62,000,000 in 1916.
