OVER THE NORTHWEST

LOVE TRIANGLE IS FATAL TO TWO MEN

WOMAN IN CASE BELIEVED TO BE DYING AS RESULT OF SHOOTING AFFRAY.

William McChandler and W. H. Clark of Portland Are Dead; Mrs. Amanda Bonner Seriously Wounded.

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—William McChandler, 39, of 557 1-2 Williams avenue, was shot and killed, and Mrs. Amanda Bonner, 29, of the same address, was probably fatally wounded at Williams avenue and Russell street last night by W. H. Clark, an unsuccessful suitor for the hand of Mrs. Bonner. Clark shot through his pistol on himself and fell dead with a bullet in his brain.

Mrs. Bonner and Mr. McChandler were walking north on the west side of Williams avenue, when Clark came up behind them on the other side of the street. Witnesses say he crossed Williams avenue, walked up close to the couple and opened fire with an automatic pistol.

Both Men Fall Dead.

On shot struck Mrs. Bonner in the head and another passed through her lungs. McChandler fell dead with a bullet through his brain, and another in his breast.

Clark then turned his pistol on himself, firing one shot through his brain. The three lay on the pavement together until an ambulance arrived to take Mrs. Bonner to the Good Samaritan hospital. The others were taken to the public morgue.

Oil Company Is Formed.

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 10.—For many years there have been rumors of oil in the Rogue River valley, all prospectors have come and gone but as yet no oil has been found. Believing there is oil here and that proper organization will find it, the Rogue River Oil Company has been organized in Medford with the following officers: President, Dr. E. E. Pickels; secretary, A. E. Reames; treasurer, James W. Dunlop; directors, Dr. F. C. Page and J. W. Dressler. Dr. Pickels is a well known physician in southern Oregon, while Mr. Reames is a brother of United States District Attorney Reames of Portland.

The plan of the company is along cooperative lines, with a portion of the capital stock set aside for land owners making leases to the company on a pro-rata basis of the number of acres so leased.

Mr. Kay on Flax Mission.

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer and owner of the Sabin Woolen Mills, left Tuesday night on a tour of the eastern United States and Canada to investigate the growing and manufacture of flax. He will try to enlist the aid of the signal corps in encouraging the planting of a large area in Oregon to flax this year.

W. D. E. Dodson, executive secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, under the auspices of which organization Mr. Kay is making the tour, pointed out yesterday that the government is in need of good quality linen for airplane wings, and that the Willamette valley is better adapted than any other part of the country to the production of the kind of flax that makes good linen.

Corncob Starts Big Fire.

YAKIMA, Jan. 10.—M. S. Stone, a farmer of the Selah Valley, stepped on a corncob on the floor of his new fruit warehouse Sunday night, fell backward and threw the lantern he was carrying.

The lantern exploded and the warehouse and barn, which formed part of the structure, were destroyed, with their contents, including 2000 boxes of apples. Stone saved his team, but in trying to get out other property himself was imprisoned by a trap door and narrowly escaped cremation. He was rescued by neighbors.

Eastern Oregon Shivers.

LA GRANDE, Jan. 10.—After an absence of two months, Old Man Winter returned today, cracked his icy whip over Union county and drove the mercury to below freezing at noon for the first time this winter. A sudden change last night converted wet pavements to ice thoroughfares, over which pedestrians and animals skidded today. A flurry of snow accumulated of all kinds are in serious danger as all such were prematurely buried.

Salvation lies in a gradual approach of real winter; whereas, zero weather inside the next week would do serious harm. Reports indicate that the cold is wide in an area embracing Walla Walla county and most of the Blue mountain districts.

Pastor Becomes Chaplain.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 10.—Rev. E. O. Hoffmeister, pastor of St. Paul's English Lutheran church, has been commissioned first lieutenant in the army as chaplain, with the coat of arms and ordered to Fort Worden, Wash.

Lieutenant Hoffmeister will fill his pulpit Sunday morning and evening, and following the evening service from 8:25 until 10 o'clock a farewell reception will be held in the parlors of the church. Mr. Hoffmeister has a wife and daughter, who will remain at their home, 7th West Twelfth street.

R. R. LEWIS HAS 1400 ACRES UNDER CULTIVATION ON BUTTER CREEK RANCH.
