What Saving Bread for Breakfast.
Cereal Muffins.
1 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup cooked oatmeal, 1/2 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon vegetable oil.
Mix together the dry ingredients.

Spoon Bread.
2 cups water, 1 cup skim milk, 1 cup cornmeal, 1 tablespoon fat, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt.
Mix water and cornmeal and bring to the boiling point and cook 5 minutes. Beat eggs well and add with the other ingredients to the mush. Beat well and bake in a well greased pan for 25 minutes in a hot oven. Serve from the same dish with a spoon. This recipe makes enough for six.

Buckwheat Muffins.
2 cups buckwheat, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/4 cups milk, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon melted shortening, 2 tablespoons molasses.
Sift together the dry ingredients. Combine the milk, beaten egg, melted fat and molasses. Add the liquid to the dry ingredients. Mix well and bake 25 to 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven.
Flax flour or one cup of barley meal and one cup of wheat flour may be used in this recipe if the liquid is reduced to 1 to 1 1/4 cups.
