Will Meet With Premiers and Military Leaders of Allies.

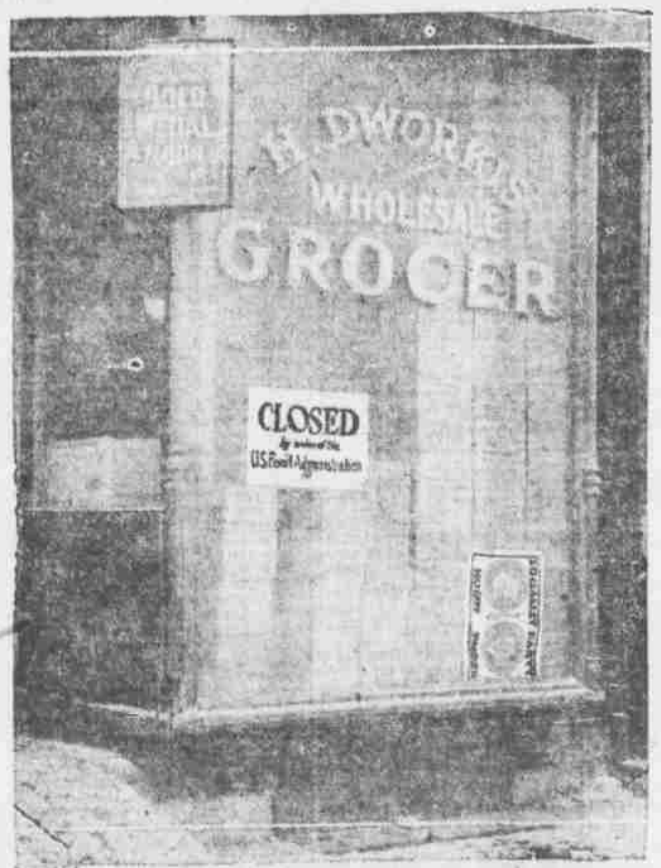
