VOLUNTEERS ENLIST

With the arrival of hundreds of new books, the increased use being made of the library and a shortage on the regular staff, the work at the county library would have been greatly hampered if friendly helpers had not offered their services wherever needed. With often three at a time to help, all of the 600 new books have been carried through the five stages of proper opening, embossing, cutting leaves and the pasting of book pockets and date slips. WOMAN SUFFRAGE CHIEF MAY RUN FOR CONGRESS



Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, which has won its greatest victory by winning New York state to the suffrage column, has been mentioned as a candidate for the house of representatives from New York city. Her friends are urging her to run with the idea that she shall become a candidate for the first vacancy from her state in the United States senate. Were Mrs. Catt sent to the house she would be the second woman to sit there, Montana already having sent one.

GRAZING PRIVILEGES ON NATIONAL FOREST MUST NOT BE SOLD

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—District Forester George H. Costt announces that the secretary of agriculture is notifying all holders of permits for grazing livestock on the national forests that the payment of any bonus or allowance for waiver of the grazing privilege in connection with sales of livestock or ranch properties will be cause for revocation of the permit. This is in accordance with one of the regulations governing the use of the national forests for grazing privileges, which provides that permits will be granted only for the exclusive use and benefit of the owners of the stock and will be forfeited if sold or transferred in any manner or for any consideration. To protect permittees who may wish to dispose of their property against the losses which would result from the revocation of permits would not be able to obtain a fair value for their property. But the procedure has aimed throughout at such a safeguarding of the situation as would prevent the acquisition of anything approaching vested rights in the public property by private individuals or companies. Owing to the great and ever-growing demand for use of the forest ranges, which is now in most regions far beyond their capacity, the grazing privilege is of large value. Upon the national forests the government supplies a system of regulated use designed to encourage production, promote the upbuilding of the country along healthy lines, and secure the greatest good to the greatest number, but makes only a moderate charge for the grazing permits. In the view of those in charge of the national grazing business, it would be entirely unfair for the public to forego a maximum return for the value of use of its property and then allow those granted the privilege of use to collect this value from others at the price of surrendering their privileges. Such a practice would, they say, make competitive disposal by the government of the grazing the only logical course. As Secretary Houston says in warning the range users that the payment of bonuses or the giving of any consideration to secure the failure of a holder of the grazing privilege is prohibited, "such a payment would be a consideration for a privilege the granting of which is wholly within the discretion of the government and for which no one is entitled to receive compensation." Therefore any such payment will be sufficient cause for the revocation of permit or forfeiture of all grazing preferences based upon the purchase of permitted stock.
