DEATH OF INDIAN RECALLS OLD DAY

TIN-TI-MEET-SA WAS ONE OF FEW REMAINING REDSKINS TO CONTACT PAST AND PRESENT.

In the death of Tin-ti-meet-sa on the Umatilla reservation last week passed one of the few remaining Indians who connect the present with the historic past, when the Indian was wild and free. His death recalls again the Whitman massacre of almost 80 years ago.

Tin-ti-meet-sa, an Indian old in years and in experience, was buried on Friday under Catholic rites, and with him passed the last of the direct male line of Cayuse chiefs of that blood and family. He leaves no children.

His father, Tin-ti-meet-sa, perhaps the man known to history as Camas-pelo, was a prominent figure in the days when the white men appeared on the Pacific Northwest, and was the friend of the whites in the struggles which marked the years immediately subsequent to the death of Marcus Whitman. He was the man who came to the relief of the survivors of the massacre, and who held the warlike Cayuses in check; hoof or check was possible in those stormy

times. He lived to witness the setting of the Indian sun, and died in his home in Walla Walla in 1869.

He who has just died was in his late teens when Whitman was murdered by members of the Cayuse tribe under the leadership of mixed blood and hot headed sub-chiefs, but took no part in the tragedy. He was allotted lands on the Umatilla reservation and has made his home there for many years.

Two ailed sisters, and Joseph Craig, a nephew, are the only living members of the family, except a widow who is of a northern tribe.
