OVER THE NORTHWEST

DATA IS GIVEN ON SCHOOL CONDITIONS

WITH FIVE COUNTIES MISSING CENSUS SHOWS 181,196 PUPILS.

Increase Deemed Likely; Deschutes, Jackson, Wasco, Lake and Umatilla Not Tabulated.

SALEM, Jan. 25.—With five counties still missing, and no apparent indication of their being received, the school census for 1917 shows a total of 181,196. The total for 1916 was 202,417.

Giving to the five missing counties, the same census as the last one available, the total for this year would be 202,417, but as unquestionably there were increases in all of these five counties, the complete total, it is believed, would show a reasonable increase for 1917 over 1916. The five missing counties are Deschutes, Jackson, Wasco, Lake and Umatilla. Wasco reported, but furnished the census for the county, rather than for school children.

Veteran Visits in Baker.

BAKER, Jan. 25.—Ed Prescott, father of Ned Prescott and brother of Mrs. Frank Graham of this city, who for over two years has been in service with a British regiment in France, arrived here today for a two weeks' visit.

Mr. Prescott, who is 69 years old, is known as the "Daddy of his regiment." He is on an extended furlough, having been injured by a broken leg and other wounds recently. Mr. Prescott lived in Baker county for many years.

Man Lodges Many Deaths. TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Jan. 25.—Charles Miser, a telephone lineman of Jarbridge, Nev., had a close escape from death today while on his way here when he was shot, beaten and stabbed by three men who robbed him of \$153 and threw him over a 50-foot cliff. He alighted in unharmed and regained consciousness an hour later and gave the alarm.

Three Mexicans were arrested in connection with the attack and are being held here.

Man Attacked by Mad Pig. COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Jan. 25.—Jasper Patten had a narrow escape from death a few days ago when attacked by a boar pig, which

had gone amuck. Only by climbing into a tree and calling his dogs to his assistance was he able to escape. One of the dogs was badly run to pieces before the hog was run into an enclosure. A horse had been attacked by the pig and Mr. Patten was going to the assistance of the horse when he was attacked.

Vancouver Elects Woman. VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 25.—Early returns indicated the election here today of Mrs. Ralph Smith to the seat left vacant in the provincial legislature by her husband, the late Hon. Ralph Smith.

Mrs. Smith was leading in every ward of the city. Her majority may reach 1500.

Miss Clark to Go Across. TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 25.—Miss Constance Clark, director of the hostess house at Camp Lewis, working under the direction of the National War Work Council of the Y. W. C. A. has been assigned to go to France.

She will have charge of comforts arranged for women nurses and others engaged in war work. Miss Clark was notified of her appointment two weeks ago but deferred giving a definite answer until the Northwestern division of the council gave its consent. She will remain here until a successor arrives to take her place.

Miss Clark is the daughter of an army officer. She had charge of the Y. W. C. A. House at the Panama Exposition and has done important work for the association.

PLAN IS ANNOUNCED FOR NITRATE SALE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The Secretary of Agriculture today announced the plan for the sale and distribution of the 100,000 tons of nitrate of soda for fertilizer purchased under the provision in the Food Control Act which authorizes the President to secure nitrate of soda and to supply it to farmers for cash at cost. A circular in which the plan is fully set forth is being mailed today to the county agents who will receive orders for the nitrate and transmit them to Washington.

The f. o. b. price at ports will be \$75.50 a ton, farmers paying the freight charges from the port of arrival and state fertilizer tag fee. The plan is that in each county where there is a county agent to have the agents associate with themselves three or more local business men in each community, who will serve without compensation to assist them in the sale of the nitrate. In each county where there is no county agricultural agent a committee of three or more local business men will be appointed. A farmer living in such a county who desires to make application for nitrate should apply to the committee, who will forward an inquiry to the state director of extension for his state. The post office address of the director of extension in each state is given in the circular. The ships carrying the nitrate will be directed to the most convenient ports, including Charleston, Wilmington, Savannah, Norfolk and Baltimore. Representatives, who also will serve without compensation, have been or will be selected to handle the shipments at these places.

Farmers will make application for nitrate upon blanks furnished by the county agents or the local committees. Applications must be signed and returned so as to reach the county agents or members of the local committees by February 4. As the nitrate, under the law, can be sold only for cash, the farmer will be required to deposit the money covering the cost of the nitrate he wishes with the local bank, association, or individual to be designated by the Department. The orders will be transmitted to the Department, accompanied by the amount covering the same. If the quantity of nitrate that can be secured will fill all orders, each farmer will

secure the amount he requests; otherwise it will be necessary to allot the nitrate to those applying for it so that all may participate on equal terms in its distribution. None of the nitrate will be sold to dealers, either directly or indirectly. It will be sold only to farmers directly for cash at cost, and generally not in excess of the amounts used by them heretofore.

The Government is making every effort to reach farmers who desire a part of this nitrate, but states that it will be impossible for the county agents or other persons to visit every individual farmer, and urges all who desire to purchase nitrate to get in touch with their local county agent or a member of their local committee.

LOAN NEARLY ALL PAID.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—All but \$15,000,000 of the \$2,000,000,000 total of the second Liberty Loan had been paid into the treasury today and most of the balance probably will be reported tomorrow. The collections have been \$2,783,000,000. Receipts from war savings and third stamps have been \$21,335,000.


