ORDNANCE MEN WILL GET CHANCE TO SEE SERVICE IN FRANCE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EPHRAIM, Ore., Feb. 6.—Young men between the ages of 21 and 45 who want to see active service in France will have their chance to see it in the near future.

The University school already has turned out two classes of Ordnance men and now is giving the course of special training to the third class. A fourth class will be organized on March 11 and applications for entry number already are being received by Lieutenant C. C. Johnson in charge of the work. This course consists of six weeks of intensive training in the duties that men in the Ordnance department of the army will have to perform when they get to France.

While the men completing the course go into service as privates, the opportunity for early advancement has made the work attractive to the students. Instructors are required to inform the War Department regarding the work done by each student during the course so that those men who display "the proper caliber for a non-commissioned grade" may be promoted and sent into the government service for special training.

The course consists of a number of military exercises. The men are equipped before they are admitted. They are allowed the regular pay of privates in the army of \$48 per month, with 25 cents per day in addition, but are required to pay their own expenses while in Ephraim. Officers' effort is made to give the men the experience of the course. In connection with the studies, the men are given one hour of military training every day, consisting of some physical and infantry, squad drill and platoon movements. In the last week of the course the classes go to Portland to make personal inspection of some of the large manufacturing plants there to learn how supplies are received, handled and distributed. This knowledge is of immense practical value to the men after they get into the army.

Men of draft age are eligible for admission. When a man of draft age has accepted his name, residence, serial number and other particulars are sent to the chief of Ordnance at Washington, D. C. From receipt of competent orders from the chief of Ordnance the local draft board then induces the man to serve and orders him to report to the Ordnance Training School at Ephraim, Ore. It is possible for drafted men to enter the Ordnance course after they have been called before their board for physical examination and it is not possible to enter after the man has been ordered to a camp. Men past the draft age are able to enter without this formality.

Candidates must undergo physical examination and the requirements are 501 as severe as in the national army. In view of the fact that the work of the Ordnance department is behind the lines such minor defects as underweight, overweight, flat feet, missing fingers or toes are waived, providing the men are otherwise sound.

The work of the Ordnance Department, next to the units engaged in actual fighting, is one of the most important in the service. The government now is engaged in building up its armaments, costing \$100,000,000 in France and requires a large number of trained and skilled men to operate them. The University of Oregon, in co-operation with other Universities has been designated to train the men. The work of the men in active service consists of buying, handling and accounting for the munitions and military equipment of the army. These men must be thoroughly trained and must be 100 per cent efficient for the reason that thousands of lives depend upon their having the arms and munitions at the right place at the right time.

NEW LIGHTS ARE BIG ADVANTAGE

With the turning on of more new street lights in the residence district the street illumination of this city has been improved more than 100 per cent. The new 250 candle power nitrogen lamps are being used on each corner and in all sections where the lights are now in use excellent illumination is provided.

According to Mayor Vanhook, the new service will be provided at but slight additional expense to the city. The chief benefit arises from use of the nitrogen lamps instead of the old ones. "On Main street 600 candle power nitrogen lights will be used at each intersection and at the middle of each block, thus improving the lighting system in the business section.

It's all off, this stuff about the jazz band being a creation of Broadway. The Chinese did it 1200 years ago! Here's a picture to prove that the original jazz band was well known some 600 A. D. These four Chinese images, made about that year, have just reached New York after being buried for hundreds of years, and are now in the possession of M. Parish-Watson of 559 Fifth-av. The girl to the left has a flute. Next to her is a reed instrument performer, whose modern counterpart is the jazz saxophonist. It doesn't take any stretch of the imagination to see where the ukelele comes from after glancing at the next performer. The girl to the right is the official noise-maker, with cymbals. These images were made by the imperial potter for some former Empress of China, and were placed in her tomb at her death to furnish music for her spirit.

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
