

# NEWS NOTES OF PENDLETON

### To Play Echo Tonight.

A basketball game has been arranged between the boys' team of the Pendleton high school and the Echo high school team for tonight. The game is to be played on the P. H. S. floor starting at 7:30. Echo beat Pendleton by one point in a game at Echo and tonight the local boys hope to turn the tables on their opponents.

### John Hamley Is Here.

John Hamley, now in the navy and stationed at San Diego, where he is the yeoman of his company, is here upon a five days' furlough to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Hamley. He reports all the Pendleton boys doing well at San Diego and is himself in splendid physical condition, having gained 10 pounds since his enlistment.

### Exams Commence Again Monday.

The new regulations governing the physical examination of men in Class 1 arrived this morning and notice has been given that Dr. D. J. McPaul will recommence the examining of men Monday morning. The new regulations are less severe in that they permit the taking of men who would have been disqualified under the old regulations. Registrants already rejected under the old regulations will probably be re-examined.

### Would Be County Agent.

### Rabies in Klamath County.

The local office of the biological survey this morning received a telegraphic appeal from County Agent H. H. Glasper of Klamath county for aid against rabid coyotes. There has been a fresh outbreak of rabies there, the message stated, and the situation is serious. Thirteen dead canines were found on one ranch. This is the third appeal for aid from these coyotes having been sent in by the state veterinarian and the state health officer. The biological survey has funds available for the hiring of exterminators and right now it is impossible to get any of the present

hunters into the infected area because of the deep snows in the mountains.

## WOMEN ARE TAKING PLACES OF MEN IN MANY LINES OF WORK

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Secretary Baker has appointed six women and three men to investigate the advisability of an organization for women's war service similar to Britain's women's army auxiliary corps as part of the American army. They would wear uniforms and work behind lines, releasing men for the front. They work under strict military rule. One duty of the women is keeping the soldiers' graves green and properly marked.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Throughout the United States, women's entrance into men's work, releasing men for the army and shipyards is increasing in the scope of duties performed in Oregon, approximately 2,000 are replacing men in clerical work, gas-fitting stations and wooden box factories. One Oregon woman is a blacksmith, two others are brass finishers. Scores of women in Oregon and Washington are wiring engines and cleaning passenger coaches. Washington has one telephone line-woman. Montana has a number of women news vendors aboard trains. In Pittsburgh and Philadelphia approximately 50,000 women are in what was formerly considered men's jobs. Several section crews on the Pennsylvania road include women track-hands.

### Earl Withycombe In A Military Hospital

SALEM, Or., Feb. 9.—Governor Withycombe received a telegram Thursday night from the war department advising him that his son, Earl, who is a private in the engineer corps of the army, was not aboard the Tacoma which was sunk Wednesday off the coast of Ireland by a German submarine. Private Withycombe originally was a member of Company D, Fifth battalion of the Twentieth engineers, which was one of the units of the organization in the ill-fated transport, but on account of sickness he was transferred to another unit. Private Withycombe is at present in a military hospital.
