### U. S. PAYS DU PONT'S \$2,000,000 FOR WORK

Company's Experts Supervised Building of Government's Nashville Powder Plant.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—For supervising the erection and organization of the government powder plant at Nashville, Tenn., the Du Pont Engineering Company, a subsidiary of the Du Pont Powder Company, will receive a fee of approximately \$2,000,000. Secretary Baker announced tonight that a flat payment of \$500,000 will be made the company for preliminary engineering services, and an additional 3 per cent of the construction cost will be paid. The plant will be operated by the Du Pont Company for the government for about six months at a compensa-

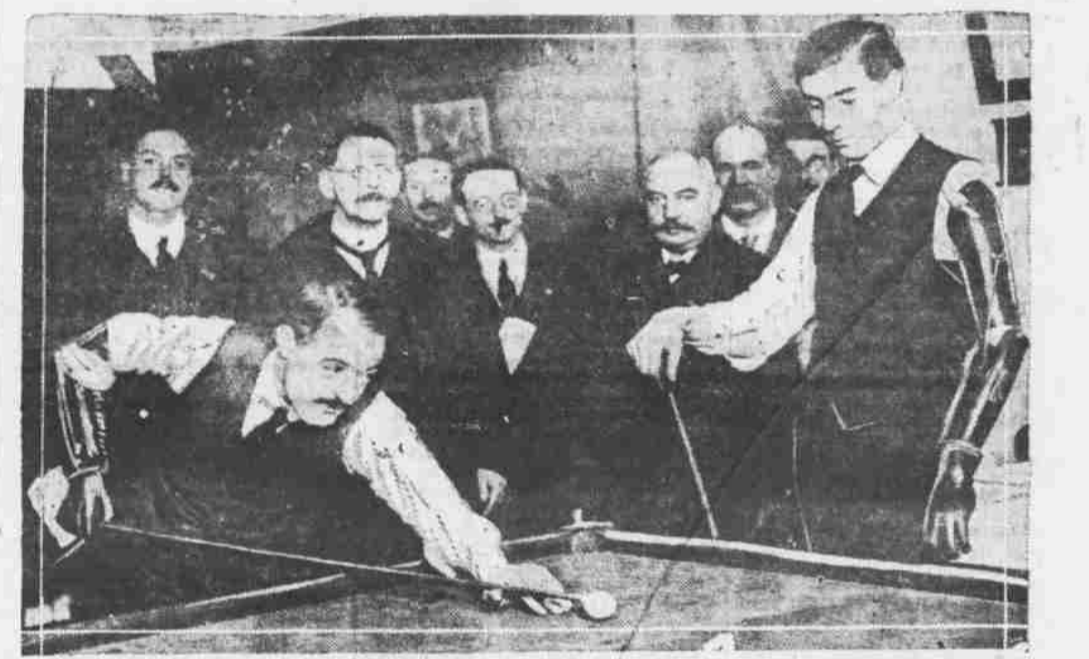

## Daily Chats With the Housewife

### MAKING WARTIME USE OF RYE

By Americans rye has been looked upon rather as fodder than as human food. But in northern Europe rye bread has been almost the foundation of their diet, while rye porridge has taken the place of our oatmeal as a breakfast dish. The well known pumpernickel of Germany is made of rye.

Both the appeal of patriotism and its greatly increased market price are prompting the farmers of this country to put more of their land to rye. Millers are being urged to grind it and housewives of the country can do their part by learning how to use it as a wartime substitute. The following recipes for the bread, muffins and drop cakes will give variation to "wheatless" days.

**Rye Bread.**  
1 cup scalded milk.  
1 cup boiling water.  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt.  
1 yeast cake dissolved in 1-1/4 cup of lukewarm water.  
2 cups flour.  
Rye meal.  
To milk and water add cake and flour, beat thoroughly, cover, and let rise until light. Add rye meal until dough is stiff enough to knead; knead thoroughly, let rise, shape in loaves, let rise again and bake.

**Rye Muffins.**  
1 cup rye meal.  
2-4 cup flour.  
1-4 cup sugar.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
5 teaspoons baking powder.  
1 cup milk.  
1 egg.  
2 tablespoons melted fat.  
Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk gradually, egg well beaten, and melted fat; bake in hot oven in greased muffin pans, twenty five minutes.

**Rye Drop Cakes.**  
2-3 cup rye meal.  
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2-4 cup flour.  
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
1/2 cup milk.  
2 tablespoons molasses.  
1 egg.  
Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk gradually, molasses and egg well beaten.
