## WILSON INVITES AUSTRIA TO PEACE PARLEY.

## GERMAN EMPERS OMIT CUPPER.

Say 50,000 Instead of 200,000 Americans Will Be in France. GENEVA, Feb. 11.—The declaration by Secretary of War Baker that there would be 100,000 American soldiers in France early this year has been distorted in German newspapers. The Manchester Guardian writes that the Kaiser's speech on Feb. 11 says the number will be only 50,000. The Koenigsberg Volks Zeitung says the number will be only several divisions.

## CHEAP TRAVEL MOST ESSENTIAL.

One of First Steps to Be Taken After War, Says Ambassador Page. LONDON, Feb. 11.—Cheap and comfortable travel between the United States and England will be one of the first steps in post-war reconstruction, in the opinion of the American ambassador, Walter H. Page, speaking before the teachers' training department of King's college here this week. He declared that, among persons the Atlantic must be placed within the means of all, especially teachers and students.

## EVERETT GETS LOAN OF GUNS.

Will Be Used to Decorate Parks of City. WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Senator Pendleton's bill authorizing the secretary of the navy to loan condemned arms and cannon balls to the sons of veterans camp at Everett to decorate the parks of that city passed the senate today.
