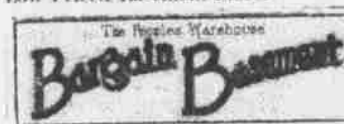

SUSPENS GROVER LICENSE FOR SUGAR OVERCHARGING

The Food Administration issues the following:

"The suspension of Grover for 24 hours is the penalty by which the United States Food Administration will punish Phillip Applebaum, New York wholesale and retail grocer, for selling sugar at exorbitant prices. John Tomlinson, a baker, testified that he had purchased 200 pounds of sugar at 11 cents a pound, and a druggist, George Oberdorfer, testified that he had bought 200 pounds at the rate of 15 cents a pound. Applebaum was unable to contradict these charges to the satisfaction of the food administration.

The investigation, however, were limited to believe that in general Applebaum had been giving the food administration his cooperation and that only these two sales could be held against him. They recommended leniency.

He was ordered to suspend business from midnight of February 11 until midnight of February 11.

PROHIBIT GOODS FOR EXPORT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Admission made today by the war trade board to its conservation list of materials which may not be exported to any country except under license. Includes the following commodities:

Macaroni, spaghetti, vermicelli, noodles, crackers, biscuits, wheat cereals and other products made from wheat, rye, flour, rice meal, linseed meal, rape seed oil, rapeseed oil, rapeseed cake, steel furnaces, rubber and all commodities containing rubber.

EX-GREEK KING AIDS RAISSEL: Her King Constantine is continuing LONDON, Feb. 12.—According to the open hostility toward the present Ruler's Athens correspondent, for Greek government. It has been dis-

covered that his propaganda extended to expatriated Greeks, a recruiting campaign being carried on in Constantinople among Greek officers residing there. Some of the soldiers have appeared on the Macedonian front. Sofia and Constantinople advisers are to the effect that negotiations agreed upon when he abdicated the throne have not reached Constantinople for some time owing to hostility to the Greek government.

Former King Constantine of Greece is now in Switzerland, according to latest intakes.

WAR COSTING U. S. \$24,000,000 A DAY

In Ten Months \$5,000,000,000 Has Been Lent to Allies—Expense Increasing.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Ten months of the war have cost the United States about \$1,000,000,000 at the rate of nearly \$24,000,000 a day.

More than half of the huge sum of \$1,121,000,000 has been paid as loans to the allies, and the balance, about \$2,000,000,000, represents America's outlay for its own war purposes, exclusive of more than \$600,000,000 for ordinary governmental expenses.

The war's toll in money is increasing at the rate of more than \$190,000,000 a month, and indications now are the two remaining months of the nation's first year as a belligerent will run its war bill to nearly \$10,000,000,000, of which \$5,000,000,000 will be for allied loans and about the same amount for the army, navy, shipping board and other war agencies.

These figures were compiled today from the latest available Treasury figures.

GAS ENGINE EXPERTS NEEDED BY PERSHING

Skilled Youngsters to be Recruited, and Are Promised Active Service Without Delay.

ALBANY, Feb. 12.—Automobile and gas engine men who understand high class engines are needed by Gen. Pershing to aid the United States army program. They will be recruited all over the country and 5000 will be trained in the Motor Mechanics' Regiment at Fort Hancock, Augusta, Ga., together with blacksmiths, forgers, canvas workers, expert auto-mechanics, acetylene welders and woodworkers, who also are wanted.

More than 25 per cent of those recruited will rank as non-commissioned officers. The pay will range from \$30 a month for privates up to \$150 for men specially qualified, together with allowances for dependents of from \$5 to \$25 a month, according to the number. All will be assured of prompt active service quickly.

The men are to repair airplane engines. It is expected that most of the men recruited will be from eighteen to twenty years of age; as men of draft age cannot enlist. No more chauffeurs are needed for this special service.
