Filipino Employed on President's Yacht Is Accused of Stealing Linen Worth \$150.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Manuel Santos, twenty-eight a Filipino who enlisted in the navy nine years ago, is facing a court martial by the naval authorities, charged with stealing linen valued at \$150 from the President's yacht Mayflower, to which he was assigned as a cabin steward. The accused sailor stated that the linen had been given him by another member of the Mayflower's crew. Lieut. Commander C. T. Osborn, commanding the Presidential yacht, discovered the loss and immediately reported to the police.
