FATE OF HI-GILL TO BE DECIDED TODAY

INTEREST CAMPAIGN FOR MAYOR IN HISTORY OF SEATTLE BROUGHT TO CLOSE

Betting favors the Hanson; Seven candidates in the field; Only mild interest in Councilmen.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 19.—Seattle is going to the polls today to nominate two candidates for mayor, out of a field of seven, and six candidates for councilman out of a field of 15. There is a contest of small importance for corporation counsel and the food controller, Harry W. Carroll, and city treasurer, Ed L. Terry, are unopposed.

Probably the interest campaign for mayor in the history of Seattle closed last night with Mayor Hiram Charles Gill, seeking re-nomination after the most tempestuous political career in the history of Seattle, addressing a mass meeting at the Hippodrome, and Ole Hanson, his political opponent, speaking in the Beacon Hill district to his old friends and neighbors. Other meetings for mayoralty candidates were held in the Labor Temple, the Broadway high school and on the streets.

Betting favors Hanson. Betting favors the nomination of Hanson by a vote in excess of the Gill vote and any other candidate the betters may name combined. In the campaign Hanson has had the support of the three daily newspapers; Gill has had no newspaper support. The issue has been what the candidates opposing Gill have unanimously termed Gillism, and the mayor has

accepted the challenge and fought back.

Soldiers Get Liquor.
CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Feb. 19.—More liquor is now being sold to soldiers on Tacoma streets than in several months past, according to Mayor Eugene B. West, chief judge advocate. Mayor West did not reveal his source of information, but said he understood a group of Tacoma physicians are responsible for the increase.

The hut will have a reading room, dining room and assembly room. It will be a two-story structure.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Feb. 19.—Harry Lauder, Scotch comedian, appears at the local cantonment today and tonight to address and entertain the soldiers. In conjunction with his farwell vaudeville tour, Lauder is visiting all of the cantonments under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A.

First hand war lessons will be reported to the boys of the 91st division by Lauder, who after the death of his only son in France, followed the battle lines cheering the soldiers as he journeyed to the boy's grave.
