Daily Chats With the Housewife

Banana rice pudding—To three-fourths of a cup of rice add four tablespoons of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one and one-half cups of water, and boil with a stick of cinnamon until the rice is tender; afterward remove the cinnamon. When cold stir in two sliced bananas, pour into a glass dish, fill up with soft custard and serve at once.
Bananas en casserole—Take the peel from five or six bananas; scrape off the coarse threads and cut the bananas in halves, lengthwise, and the pieces in halves, crosswise. Put these into a casserole. Melt a small glass of currant jelly in a cup of boiling water and pour over the bananas. Then squeeze over them the juice of half a lemon; cover the dish and let cook in a moderate oven about half an hour. Serve from the casserole as a vegetable.
Banana float—Mix one and one-half tablespoons of cornstarch with one and one-half cups of sugar, add the yolks of four eggs and one quart of milk. Stir over a slow fire until the mixture begins to thicken, then add one-half teaspoonful of lemon extract. Take from the fire and set aside to cool. Slice four large bananas into the serving dish and pour the custard over them. Beat up the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, then beat three tablespoons of sugar into them with four drops of lemon juice. Arrange this meringue on the top of the custard and serve.

RAISIN RYE BREAD.

One cup whole wheat flour.
Two cups rye flour.
One cup corn meal.
One cup raisins (seeded are best).
Five teaspoonful baking powder.
One-half teaspoon salt.
Four tablespoonful brown sugar.
Four tablespoonful fat, oil or drippings.

Three cups of skim milk.
Method—Mix all dry ingredients thoroughly, wash, dry and flour raisins. Stir raisins into flour. Add milk, then melted fat or oil. Pour into shallow oiled pan. Bake thirty to forty minutes. Serve hot or cold.

Peanut Butter Fluff.
One-half glass of peanut butter.

Three-quarters of a glass of cold water.

Method—Place peanut butter in bowl; slowly beat in the water until the mixture is the consistency of thick beaten cream. Prepare this just before using, and only make as much as needed, because it is best when fresh.

Rhubarb Honey.
One-half pound of rhubarb.
One cup of sugar.
One egg water.

Method—Wash rhubarb, cut up skins and all. Add water. Boil until tender. Strain to remove pulp. Stir sugar into strained liquid. Boil three minutes. Cool and serve. Save solid part of rhubarb for pie.

Baked Pears.
Ten halves of dried pears.
Five tablespoonfuls sugar.
One cup syrup.
One cup of water in which pears were soaked.

Method—Wash dried pears in several waters. Soak over night in enough water to cover. Place cut side of pears upward. Pour over syrup, add flavoring. Bake until juice is thick and syrupy. Syrup has more sweetening power than same amount of sugar added directly and it is a matter of economy to make syrup whenever possible.

Minute Pudding.
One cup white flour.
Two cups boiling water.
One-half teaspoonful salt.

Method—Stir quickly, thoroughly sifted flour into salted boiling water. Boil five minutes. This should look granular and smooth. Serve with top milk.

Baked Apples.
Three red apples.
Six teaspoon seeded raisins.
Water to cover.

Method—Wash, halve and core apples. Crowd in pan, cut side up. Place two teaspoonful raisins in each half apple. Cover with water. Boil on top of stove until tender and water is nearly boiled out. Serve hot or cold.
