#### L. J. SIMPSON SEEKS GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

PROMINENT COOS BAY BUSINESS MAN ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY.

Four of State Planned; Economical Business-Like Administration Is Promised.

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—L. J. Simpson, prominent business man of Coos Bay, yesterday announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor. In his platform Mr. Simpson pledges himself to a clean, economical, business-like administration, and promises to promote the development of the natural resources of the state through the establishment of new industries and by attracting settlers to Oregon. The announcement of Mr. Simpson's candidacy will be made simultaneously in the press of the state today.

"I shall conduct a whirlwind campaign," said Mr. Simpson yesterday. "Beginning tomorrow, I shall start my campaign which will be continued every minute, allowing only a few hours for eating and sleeping, until the votes are counted. I shall visit every city and community in the state that it is possible for me to reach in the 12 weeks that intervene until election day."

**No Appointments Promised.**  
 "In my platform I have frankly made the announcement that I have not and shall not make any pledges or promises of appointment in consideration of any support of my candidacy. I am submitting my candidacy to the people for their consideration based on my platform. If nominated and elected, I propose that my hands shall be untied as to appointments, leaving me entirely free to administer the office unhampered by pre-election pledges of patronage."

"I shall appeal direct to the people for their support, assuring them that, if elected, I shall give to them the best that is in me in the way of satisfactory administration of state affairs, such as they may expect from a business man who is thoroughly acquainted with the state, its resources and industries."

**Oregon Beans Wanted.**  
 PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—Any surplus beans in the northwest are now to be mobilized for service against the Hun. The U. S. food administration in Washington today sent word here that it is in the market for all the beans Oregon and Washington can offer. The beans are sought for the army and navy.

**After Slacker Bakers.**  
 PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—Uncle Sam today started a stiff hunt for Oregon bakers falling or refusing to meet the new requirement for twenty per cent substitution of other than wheat in bread offered for sale. Inspectors are to be sent out in a couple of days to investigate reports of failure of bakers to cut down to the requirement, and if any violations are found after Monday, the violator's license will be revoked. Failure to secure a bakery license places a baker liable to a \$5000 fine or two years' imprisonment.

**Many Hat Cords Lost.**  
 CAMP LEWIS, Feb. 21.—The Liberty theater here is doing a business of \$2000 a week—half cash, half smilee coupons. For two weeks, the theater has been showing movies, but according to Sgt. Jack Stratton, former Los Angeles newspaperman and official press agent there are a number of good road shows in the offing.

The lost and found department of the theater is a busy place. Its principal findings are hat cords. These "all from the service hats of the men as they sit in the darkened building, watching the screen and it is seldom that the janitor finds less than a dozen after a show."

**Private Becomes Colonel.**  
 CAMP LEWIS, Feb. 21.—James H. Como, who enlisted as a private in the regular army before the Spanish war, has just been promoted to lieutenant colonel. Col. Como is construction quartermaster of Camp Lewis, and is in charge of nearly half a million dollars' worth of projected construction work.

#### L. J. Simpson Enters Race For Governor



Louis J. Simpson of North Bend, Coos county, announced today his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor. He makes the fifth man in the race, the other aspirants being Governor Withycombe, Gen. W. O'Leary, secretary of state, J. C. Moser and Dr. Anderson of The Dalles.

Mr. Simpson is a millionaire timberman and businessman of Coos county. He was here for the Round-Up last fall being one of the guests of C. S. Jackson.

#### ARMY MEN WILL BUY STEEDS FOR GOV'T.

TO COMB STATE FOR HORSES AND MULES; RED TAPE IS CUT.

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—Captain F. C. von Stade and Lieutenant C. C. Weeks, of the United States Army Remount Station at Fort Geogh, Mont., left Portland yesterday for a tour of the central part of the state in search for horses and mules for the army. They will buy direct from the farmers and stockmen and there will be no red tape to go through with in making payments. Funds have been deposited in Oregon banks and payment will be made direct to owners. A flat rate of \$110 for cavalry horses and \$215 apiece for mules will be paid. The horses should weigh 1000 pounds and up, be saddle-broken and hardened. Horses fresh from the range are not wanted. Likewise mules should be broken and should be 1200 pounds up in weight and hardened.

Captain von Stade and Lieutenant Weeks will be in Prineville today, Redmond tomorrow, Bend February 23 to 25 inclusive and in Lewiston, Idaho, February 26 and 27. They will be back in Portland on various occasions and they may be reached at the Portland Hotel. They will make it a point to visit localities where they can find available horses and mules. Their headquarters in Portland are at the Portland Hotel.
