CATTLE PRICES ADVANCE SHARPLY

PORTLAND, March 12.—Cattle market prices showed a stiff advance at North Portland during the day. Toppie staff in the steer division found higher bids from killers and there was real competition all through the cattle market, with a Tacoma killer in the thick of the fight for supplies. Top steers sold at \$11.50, which is 50 cents higher than previous extreme figures, and the top of the cattle market generally was considered 25 to 40c higher, while ordinary to common stuff ruled about 25 to 30c higher than last week. Calling off of certain restrictions against the use of meat was considered the prime influence in the trade, although some very good quality stuff came forward to force bids higher.
