REFUGEE RELIEF IS MADE A DEPARTMENT OF RED CROSS WORK

Parent-Teacher Council Assumes Management; Mrs. Williams Board Member.

At a meeting of the Parent-Teacher Council Friday evening, Mrs. C. K. Williams, the president, was elected to represent the Parent-Teacher organizations of the city as a member of the board of managers of the Finnish Red Cross Chapter. The layette work undertaken by the Parent-Teacher circles has met with such splendid success that it is thought wise to make it a county-wide movement, and to this end the Red Cross chapter has opened a department of refugee relief work, and asked the Parent-Teacher Council to assume the management of it, electing a member to sit on their board as is the case in the various other departments.

An interesting article appears in the last "Child Welfare" magazine relative to an exhibition of made over clothing held in Washington, D. C., last April by the National Convention of the Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher associations.

Interesting mention is made of the fact that there were 24 different garments exhibited made from men's cast-off shirts. Persons donating old clothing are asked to bear this in mind. Shirts frayed at collar and cuffs, can be used to such splendid advantage.

Two Hundred Million Is Loaned to Britain

WASHINGTON, March 12.—An additional loan of two hundred million to Britain is announced by Secretary McAdoo. This brings Britain's total indebtedness to the United States to two and a half billions and the allied war indebtedness to nearly five billions.

PROTECT SOLDIERS BUYING LAND

Southern Pacific Will Ask No Payment Until After War.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 9.—Soldiers and sailors who have been buying Southern Pacific Railroad company lands on the installment plan need not worry about their payments until the war is over, according to a statement issued last night by B. A. McAllister, land commissioner for the company. These purchasers, Mr. McAllister said, would have nine months after the termination of the war in which to resume their obligations. This applied, he said, both to principal and interest.

Hayward Collapses In Portland Hotel

PORTLAND, March 12.—William (Bill) Hayward, the far-famed track coach of the University of Oregon, collapsed in the lobby of the Imperial Hotel yesterday afternoon and was removed to the Portland Surgical Hospital for observation.

Hayward arrived from Eugene yesterday to consult Dr. Wilcox N. Jones,

specialist, and was preparing to visit the physician's office in the Stevens building when he collapsed and was removed to his room. Dr. Jones immediately called to see him. He was later removed to the hospital.

Condition of Coach Not Critical.

Dr. Jones said last night that there was no immediate cause for worry regarding Hayward's condition.

Hayward has been ailing since last November, when he suffered a severe attack of pneumonia poisoning and

was confined to his bed for several weeks.

Health Falls Rapidly.

The old fight which helped make Hayward famous as a track coach and developer of athletes in all branches of sport prevented him from remaining indoors, and he soon left the farm and returned to Eugene, where he assumed charge of the track process.

His condition gradually became worse and yesterday he arrived

in this city and placed himself under the care of Dr. Jones.

HONOR EARLY REAR ADMIRALS

6. Buckwheat is not wheat, but an entirely different grain.

7. Nuts can be used in place of meat. They contain much fat and body-building material and often much starch material, too.
