Brazil Makes Good Use Of German Ships Seized

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 20.—(By Mail.)—When Brazil "regionalized" the forty-one German ships interned in her harbors since the outbreak of the war, the great southern republic accomplished an exceedingly good stroke of business.

By an agreement now completed 30 of these ships have been chartered to the French government until March, 1918, for a consideration of \$22,000,000. The entire fleet will sail under the Brazilian flag and each ship will make approximately 75 round voyages between Brazil and France. They will be used exclusively in the transportation of foodstuffs to France alone not including 2,000,000 bags of coffee already under contract.

Although many of the ships were damaged by their German crews and officers before the Brazilian seizure in the idea that they could not be used by Germany's enemies, several of the steamers are already in service and the remainder will be in commission in the near future. As far as has been announced but one of the ships will necessitate repairs beyond the facilities of Brazilian shipyards.

The S. S. "Leopoldina," a 12,000-ton steamer, will be towed to the United States for overhauling and re-outfitting.
