The following statistics show how the men of draft age in Umatilla county have been classified by the local and district boards. Nearly half of the registered men remaining are in Class 4 which includes not only married men with dependents but men in farming of their own land.

Of the 519 placed in Class 5, 11 are alien enemies, 34 are alien non-enemies but who have claimed exemption, 191 failed to pass the physical examinations, 255 enlisted and six are thus classified for various other causes.

Of the 194 men not classified, 42 were called on the first draft, 45 are delinquents who failed to return their questionnaires, five are dead, seven have had their registration cancelled, two are listed as deserters and three have their claims still pending.

ITALIAN TRAITORS TO FEEL IRON HAND

Many Conspicuous Persons Involved in Scandal of Waste Silk Company.
WASHINGTON, March 21.—The Italian government is determined to stamp out all traitors, an official cablegram received from Rome today says.
"All persons suspected of being implicated in the scandal of the Waste Silk Company (a concern chartered with trading with Germany)," the despatch continues, "have been arrested and proceedings against them are being carried on energetically, regardless of their social positions and of their financial standing."
The President and all the directors of the Milan concern are under arrest and many conspicuous personalities are involved. It appears that the company had business relations with the Wolf Company of St. Louis and Stuttgart and that it had been created for the purpose of extending the activities of the German company.
