NEW DECORATIONS GIVEN SOLDIERS

Medal of Honor Supplement With "D. S. C." and "D. S. M."

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Pressure of public sentiment is believed to have had much to do with the decision of the war department to supplement the congressional medal of honor with two new decorations for those distinguishing themselves in the war.

The new decorations have been designated "The Distinguished Service Cross" and "The Distinguished Service Medal." Already these titles have become abbreviated to "D. S. C." and "D. S. M." In the official order of the war department announcing their creation they are described as follows:

"Distinguished service cross—A bronze cross of appropriate design and a ribbon to be worn in lieu thereof, to be awarded by the president, or in the name of the president, by the commanding general of the American expeditionary forces in Europe, to any person who, while serving in any capacity in the army, shall hereafter distinguish himself, or herself, or who, since April 6, 1917, has distinguished himself or herself by extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy of the United States under circumstances which do not justify the award of the medal of honor.

A Bronze Medal—A bronze medal of appropriate design, and a ribbon to be worn in lieu thereof, to be awarded to any person * * * who has distinguished himself or herself by exceptional meritorious service to the government in a duty of great responsibility in time of war, or in connection with military operations

against an armed enemy of the United States."

The same order provides for the issuance of "wound ribbons" to officers and men who are injured in action, and for "war service chevrons" for each six months of service during the present war.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Every tinge of pro-Germanism in the personnel of the membership of the New York Athletic Club, the use of German in conversation about the club house and German and pro-German books in its library, are to be weeded out through action taken by the club's board of governors. The governors announced today that this action had been decided upon at a recent meeting at which one member was expelled and three others were suspended pending trial April 5.

SWEDISH SAILOR ACCUSED OF COMMUNICATING WITH RUSS

NORFOLK, Va., April 3.—J. J. Johansen, a Swedish member of a Norwegian vessel in this port, was arrested today by government agents and is held pending investigation. Federal Shipping Commissioner Paddington, who furnished the information leading to the arrest said he found in Johansen's possession papers showing that the sailor had been in communication with German secret agents. Details were withheld.
