**CONSERVATION of CREDIT**  
 ELIMINATION OF NON-ESSENTIAL CREDIT REQUIRED DURING THE WAR.

The Twelfth Federal Reserve Bank has sent a circular notice to all banks in the district, announcing that it will look with disfavor on all non-essential credit paper during the progress of the war. Non-essential means of course non-war essential.

"Preparations are being made for government regulation of credit for corporate financing, intended to restrict or discriminate against credit for non-essential purposes," reads the letter. "The restriction or limitation of credit for other non-essential purposes is quite as necessary and may, at any time, be placed under government regulation, but this discrimination should be immediately initiated and voluntarily applied by banks whose opportunity for such discrimination is immediate. In order to meet the requirements of the government we must have conservation of credit as well as conservation of food. When this war crisis is past bankers may again properly say, 'It is my first duty to care for my customers.'"
