BEEF MARKET IS NOW VERY STRONG

PORTLAND, April 10.—There was practically nothing offering in the cattle division of the North Portland market during the morning, although there were 19 full loads reported in. Six of them came from Idaho and four from Utah, but the entire shipment went direct to a Tacoma packer.

Extreme strength is continued in the cattle trade, but as there was a lack of offerings during the day nothing was available to test extreme quotations in any way, and they were therefore continued on a nominal basis.

DEFENSE WOMEN START BETTER BABY CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, April 8.—"It is safer to be a soldier at the front than a baby at home."

With this slogan borrowed from the bitter experiences of England in the matter of infant mortality, the Women's Committee of the Council of National Defense, is preparing for the first charge in the Better Babies Drive of the Department of Labor Children's Bureau.

The welfare campaign began April 6. The Women's Committee has sent out a call to the state committees to enlist for service. Instructions to the state organizations, who will be assigned to a quota "of the hundred thousand lives to save" have been sent by Dr. Jessica Pelzotto, head of the Department of Child Welfare of the women's committee of the Council of National Defense.

Kansas has been among the first to prepare better baby legislation. A children's bill, containing a plan for child hygiene work worthy of national attention, will be introduced at the next session of Kansas legislature.

Some of the things in the matter of child welfare that Kansas will want to do will be the finding of the rigid state inspection of institutions receiving and harboring children.

The bill also provides for public health nursing, its aim being to secure the health of school children.
