**"WE SHALL KNOCK THEM OUT, YOUR MAJESTY," SAYS LUDENDORFF TO KAISER**

LONDON, April 24.—A dispatch from Amsterdam gives a correspondent's pen picture in the Berlin Lokal-Anzeiger of the Kaiser on the western front.

"The Kaiser brings to a group of men whom he has summoned around him the news of the fall of Bapaume. 'I want to go out there at once,' he says; 'I want to see how far I can get along the Central-Bapaume road. I must see the boys who have again fought so magnificently.'

"He telephones the glorious news to the Crown Prince, and then the work of the day begins. In his gray field motor car the Kaiser goes first to Hindenburg and Ludendorff. Ludendorff works with him and, peering at the map through his eyeglass, says: 'We shall knock them out, your majesty.'

**MURDER CHARGE MADE AGAINST NINE-YEAR-OLD**

JERSEY CITY, N. Y., April 24.—A charge of murder against a 9-year-old boy, Frank Marchewski, was made in the criminal court here today. Questioned as to why he killed Edward Chorowski, 3 years old, with a rifle while they were at play yesterday, he replied:
