SOME PLANKS COMMITTED BY EARTHQUAKE

SAN JACINTO, April 26.—"Ramona," identical Indian character of Helen Hunt Jackson, suffered in the earthquake when the home of R. E. Strout fell in ruins. It was there that "Aunt Ri," now dead, was in real actors, lived, and it was there that much of the novel was written by Mrs. Jackson.

Buried in the ruins is "Ramona's chair," enmeshed in romance, a show thing here and a feature dear to the heart of many tourists. Helmet to the scene of much of the Indian romance.

"Aunt Ri," now dead, was in real life a Mrs. Jordan, remembered by a few of the oldest settlers.

AGREEMENT TO END AIR RAIDS PROPOSED IN REICHS TAG. Socialist Reported to Have Made Suggestion Regarding Open Towns Outside War Zone.

LONDON, April 24.—A Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam says that, according to advices from Berlin, during the sitting of the Reichstag, Herr Geck, socialist, suggested making an agreement with the allies to cease aerial attacks on open towns outside the war zone.

A government representative replied that no official request had hitherto come from the allies, but that should it be received, it would be examined by the military authorities.

The sum is the unexpended part of the \$250,000 which the stockholders appropriated late last year for purchasing new players and otherwise strengthening the team.
