Buy Cheaper in France.
Postmaster T. J. Tweedy has received from the postmaster general, in connection with instructions relative to receiving parcels for soldiers in France, a statement of the cost of many articles which can be purchased at the Y. M. C. A. huts in France. This statement shows that cigarettes, tobacco and many other things such as the home folks have been sending over seas to the boys, can be bought cheaper than here. This was one of the reasons which prompted the government to issue orders to postmasters not to receive parcels for shipment to France except at the approved requests of the boys themselves.

Objected to Road.
The county court last month granted a petition for the opening of what is known as the Cochran road in the east end of the county but the road is not yet established. Thereby hangs a tale. Mrs. D. W. Olinger, owner whose property the road runs, objected to the opening of the road but she could not stop the court action.
