### NEWS OF PENDLETON

**Veterans Won't Come.**  
The annual convention of the United Spanish War Veterans, scheduled for Pendleton July 3, 4 and 5, has been postponed until a year later, according to word received by J. C. Martin, commander of Malabon camp. The reason assigned is the shortage in transportation facilities. Instead a meeting of such camps as have members living in Portland will be held for the election of officers. The organization still plans meeting in Pendleton in 1919.

**Health Officers Here.**  
Dr. Robert E. L. Holt, state health officer, Colonel G. M. Magruder of Tacoma, and Attorney David Robinson of Portland, are holding a meeting with the local physicians, health officers and city authorities at the city hall this afternoon, concerning the control and care of communicable diseases. The men are making a tour of the state as a part of the government's program for weeding out and segregation of such diseases.

**HELPED MAKE FAULTY SHEELS, IT IS CHARGED**

**KANSAS CITY, May 8.**—Federal Attorney Robertson has recommended the internment of Fred Eburn, a former soldier recently released from the disciplinary barracks at Leavenworth, because of statements Eburn said to have made to fellow prisoners that in 1914 while employed in an American munition plant, he had assisted other German workmen in turning out 50,000 faulty shells.

**HELEN TAFT IS GAME**

**Scales Dizzy Fire Ladder to Sell Liberty Bonds.**  
**NEW YORK, May 8.**—Miss Helen Taft, a niece of former President Taft, made two trips today in City Hall park up an eighty-five-foot aerial ladder whose top rested against just plain nothing. Thousands held their breath as the athletic young graduate of Westover academy dared the ladder's topmost rung to record another Liberty bond bought.

"If anybody'll buy a \$1000 bond I'll jump into a fire net," called the young woman from her high perch. Many were willing to buy, but none was willing to have her jump.

**GIVES PRESIDENT POWER TO TAKE OIL LANDS**

**WASHINGTON, May 7.**—The house public lands committee approves the bill giving the President wide powers to commandeer and operate oil lands or properties. The commanding provision was unexpectedly inserted, on grounds that it is the only way the oil output can be immediately increased to meet a sudden shortage this year of 80 million gallons because of war needs.

**Deaf and Dumb Girl Was Struck By Automobile.**  
**ST. LOUIS, May 8.**—Jennie Ouhufsky 14 years old, 2329 Carr street, a deaf and dumb girl, was made temporarily blind by hysteria last night when she was struck by an automobile at North and Morgan streets.

The girl remained in the city hospital all night, without being identified and physicians thought that she had been made deaf, dumb and blind by the accident, but she recovered her sight today.

**COMEDIAN AND CHORUS SELL \$31,000 OF BONDS**

**ST. LOUIS, May 8.**—Ed Wynn, comedian of the "Over the Top" company, which is appearing here this week, put in some good, hard ticks for the Third Liberty Loan at the daily post-day patriotic rally on Twelfth street, at Olive, yesterday, when he held a large crowd for two hours and fifteen minutes with a heavy barrage of jokes, witticisms and appeals for purchases while a battalion of chorus girls from his company walked through the gathering and smilingly solicited subscriptions.

At the close of the meeting it was announced that \$31,000 worth of bonds had been bought by 175 persons, a majority of whom were led by chorus girls to the Liberty Loan wagon near the city.
