## Attacks Submarine With Lewis Gun

LONDON, May 8.—British air scrapers in a good cause never know when to quit.

A seaplane patrolling along the French and Belgian coasts, sighted two German destroyers, and attacking them with bombs, damaged the deck and stanchions.

Not satisfied, the pilot then dived 1,000 feet and attacked the vessel with a Lewis gun, firing one tray at a distance of 300 yards, scoring hits on the deck and forepart.

We did appreciate the crowd that was at the depot that bid us boys farewell with their glad hand. I hope that after this war the boys of Pendleton will get even a greater reception by returning. ### CAUSE OF DELAY IN ARMY MAIL

Postal Officials Not Told Where Troops Are.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Failure of the war department for military reasons to take the postal authorities into their confidence in the movement of troops was given by Second Assistant Postmaster-General Praeger before a house investigating committee today as the reason for delay in the delivery of mail to American soldiers in France.

"If we cannot be given full information about the troops, the army must take over the distribution of mail after it reaches France," he said.

Mail from the United States to soldiers in Europe went at the rate of 4,500,000 pieces a month before restriction was placed on parcel post packages, he said. In December 20,000 letters were found underlined at a French station, some postmarked in July.

The rapid movement of troops abroad, with only the army having knowledge of the change, had caused congestion in the delivery of mail, he said, adding that one division of troops in France for which there was a large amount of mail completely disappeared, so far as the postal authorities had knowledge.

### Y. M. C. A. GETS THANKS OF POINCARÉ

PARIS, May 9.—John R. Mott of the American Y. M. C. A. War Work Council, was received by President Poincaré yesterday and described the tour of inspection he has just completed of association work among American and French troops. The President showed keenest interest in the recital and said: "In the name of the French government and people, I wish to thank the American people for their indispensable help in placing the Y. M. C. A. at the disposal of the French army."

### Allies Take Prisoners

The allies today repulsed German attacks, taking prisoners west of Mont Didier and near Hangard-en-Santerre. Americans are located at both points.
