GERMANY BEGAN WAR TO OBTAIN TERRITORY

Lecturer Condemns Germany and Says She Has Already Lost.

"If the United States had not declared war against Germany, it would have lost its national soul," declared John Lewtas, traveler, evangelist and lecturer, who spoke on "The World War" to a good audience at the Methodist church last night. Following the lecture, Mr. Lewtas showed a number of views taken in the war zone.

In answer to Germany's assertion that she was fighting for the freedom of the seas, Mr. Lewtas said there never was a bigger lie than that emanated from the bottomless pit, for Germany had always had the freedom of every part of the globe.

Germany had planned this war for years in order to obtain more territory, and she chose the moment to strike when England was beset with internal troubles and when her territorial claims could be expected to aid the mother country, the speaker said. Germany had waded with France once, and come out the victor, and as for the United States—the German nation thought this country money-mad and entirely lacking in ideals.

When the war was started, Germany expected it to end quickly. In fact, Mr. Lewtas said, Germany military writers said that Germany would win the war in 90 days or she would never win it. "And she never will," added Mr. Lewtas.

The religion of Christ stood in Germany's way, the speaker said, for it was a religion of "Thou shalt not," and of "Blessed are the peacemakers." So Germany discarded it, and adopted that of the "übermenschen," Germany's "supermen." They believed in their own superiority and divine right, and felt that practical Christianity was no longer necessary for them.

This war is between Christianity on one side and the powers of darkness on the other, Mr. Lewtas pointed out. He asserted that Germany has already lost it, that she is hopelessly floundering about and that the allies are holding fast. Mr. Lewtas also declared that America had a million men in France if she had one, and added that our boys were on the most dangerous part of the firing line.

Mr. Lewtas denounced Russia, saying that if it hadn't been for her weakness, the American boys wouldn't needed to have come, and that this country needed not have raised a dollar for Liberty bonds or Red Cross work. He declared that "neither Prussians nor Russians should be allowed in the United States for the next 50 years," and was heartily cheered.

The lecturer gained his knowledge of war conditions from a several months' stay at the battle front before America entered the war.
