"BAD MAN" ESCAPES FROM PENITENTIARY

SALEM, May 12.—Jeff Baldwin, one of the "bad eggs" of the Oregon state penitentiary, escaped at 7:30 o'clock Sunday morning by cutting his way out through one of the basement windows. Officers who have been searching throughout the day have found no traces of him.

Baldwin, who was sentenced from Clatsop county for robbery, has made constant trouble. At one time he cut former Warden Minto after refusing to obey the latter's orders. Minto at various times took occasion to handle Baldwin roughly and finally resorted to hitting him. This act was responsible for Minto's discharge as warden of the penitentiary.

When Warden Murphy came into charge, he treated Baldwin mildly, and later made him a trustee. Last summer while working within a short distance of the prison, Baldwin escaped and was captured in Linn county only after a long pursuit. Surrounded by a posse of officers, the trustee refused to surrender to Sheriff From, knuckled the pistol from the sheriff's hand and repeatedly attempted to fire at the officer. The pistol did not discharge, as the shells caught, and Baldwin was taken immediately. He was returned to Linn county, where he was given a new trial. This time he was sentenced for attempt to kill an officer.

Baldwin some time ago was put in charge of the vegetable bin in the basement.

OVER THE NORTHWEST

Convicted as Moonshiner.

YAKIMA, Wash., May 12.—Matt Kaularich, city councilman, former chief of police and influential citizen of Cle Elum, was sentenced today by Judge P. H. Rudkin in Federal court to six months imprisonment in the Yakima county jail and to pay a fine of \$1000. Kaularich was convicted of being the leader of a gang of moonshiners who operated a still in the mountains near Cle Elum. He denied his guilt, even after convicted. Notice was given of appeal, and Kaularich is expected to secure his freedom on bond pending final action of the courts. He is an Austrian.

Hobson At Grants Pass.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 12.—A great throng of people filled the auditorium and parlors of Bethany Presbyterian church here today to listen to Captain Richard P. Hobson, of Merriam fame. On the platform with him were representatives of patriotic societies of the city. There were tense moments as Captain Hobson led his audience along the line chosen for the address, "America in War."

Storm in Wyoming.

OGDEN, Utah, May 12.—Traffic on the Union Pacific railroad, which has been delayed the past day and a half by a blizzard and snow storm in Wyoming, was restored to normal Saturday. Four inches of snow is reported at Green River, Wyo.

Ed Baldwin Resigns.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Edward Baldwin, secretary of the Oregon republican state committee, plans to retire from that office after the approaching primaries, and today sent notice of his purpose to every member of the committee and to other party workers throughout the state.

HONOLULU, May 12.—Major Harold Clark and his mechanic, Sergeant Gray, who started last week on a 200-mile inter-island flight, were discovered today in the midst of Maunakea forest, where they had been compelled to land two days ago when their gasoline supply was exhausted.

Portland Laundry Burned.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12.—Fire which broke out at 2:20 yesterday afternoon completely destroyed the plant of the Pacific Laundry, 231 Arthur street, and threatened to wipe out a number of frame buildings and dwelling houses adjoining.

G. A. R. At Albany.

ALBANY, Ore., May 12.—Oregon's Grand Army veterans thronged to Albany today for their annual encampment. They were diminished in numbers but not in spirit. On their blue uniforms appeared new buttons, never before worn at the encampment. They were Liberty Bond and Red Cross buttons, which ranged alongside the bronze token of the civil war.

Coast Trains Cut.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12.—Local train service on the O-W. R. & N. between Seattle and Portland was reduced today. This is practically the only change to be made until the big alteration comes June 1, when transcontinental lines will be revamped.

State Trap Shoot.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12.—President Arthur K. Downs of the Portland Gun Club was busily engaged today perfecting arrangements for the big Oregon championship trapshooting tournament here May 18-22. General invitations have been extended to sportsmen of Washington, Montana, Idaho and California, and many gunners from adjoining states are expected to compete for the \$500 in cash prize.

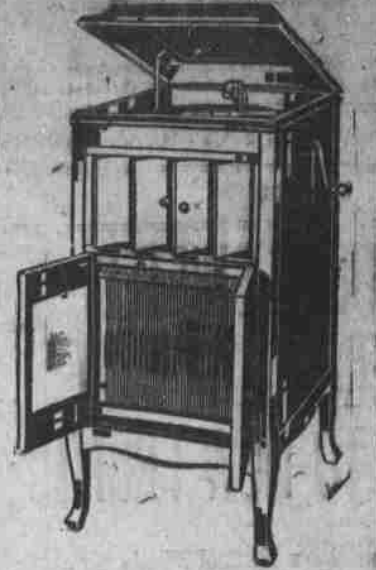
Now Teaching French.
