## OREGON HOW HAS 2 GUARD REGIMENTS

PORTLAND, Or., May 14.—Two regiments of Oregon Guard have been created, with William C. North as colonel in command, by general orders issued by Acting Adjutant-General John M. Williams. Second in command is Major Andrew T. Wood-Perth, who is elevated to the rank of lieutenant-colonel.

The First Regiment of the Oregon Guard, composed of a battalion in Portland and one in Salem, is officially attached to the National Guard of Oregon and its members will be uniformed and equipped at the expense of the state.

Battalions at Roseburg and La Grande comprise the Second Regiment of the guard. This unit is recognized as state militia, effective April 15, 1918, but remains a "separate" contingent.

These steps are the first that definitely start the program designed to give Oregon a strong infantry guard, together with cavalry and field artillery bodies.

First Regiment Numbers 760. The first regiment, now an active part of the National Guard of Oregon, has as its nucleus companies of Spanish War veterans of Portland and Salem. The personnel at present numbers 769 men and officers. Each company is being ordered to recruit up to a strength of 125 men, which will approximately double the aggregate.

Colonel North, the new commander by virtue of an election and commission, is a Spanish war veteran, former lieutenant and adjutant of the Oregon Guard and business man of Portland. Lieutenant-Colonel Wood-Perth of Salem, served in the Spanish-American war with Company M of the Third Oregon at the Mexican border. He has been identified with the Guard company at Salem since its inception.

### Wreck on Sumpter Valley

BAKER, Ore., May 14.—Ten persons were injured, two seriously, but probably not fatally, today when a Sumpter Valley Railway motor-car collided with an Oregon Lumber Company engine traveling over the Sumpter Valley tracks from Austin. The motor-car was en route to Baker from Hillsdale.

George Leland, 55, suffered a broken leg and injuries to his back; Mrs. Alice Seymour, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Seymour, sustained a broken leg and several bruises. The injured were attended by a doctor from Austin and were brought to the hospital here.

Misunderstanding of orders by Engineer Al Jones is given as the cause of the accident. The motor-car, which was put in service the first of the month, was in charge of Conductor William Spivey and Motorman Chas. Berry. It was completely demolished.

### Be Missed Ferry

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 14.—Automobilists who take chances at the Coquille ferry came to grief and their machines are dumped unceremoniously into the Coquille river.

The latest victim of speed was Ole Heidle, who attempted to run onto the ferry as it was starting. Engineer Baird had seen him and started the engine and Heidle's car had the front wheels on the apron as the ferry drew away. The auto hung on the apron for a short distance and then fell back into 15 feet of water.

### Scientist at Baker

BAKER, May 14.—Setting up of the radio station by the government naval observatory party here to study the eclipse of the sun June 1 was completed today.

Professor Hammond, in charge of the party, said that first exchange of signals with government radio station at Arlington, Va., would take place Tuesday about 1 a. m.

### Now Project Ready

KLAMATH FALLS, May 14.—A large cut has now been made near the Lost River bridge at Bonanza, where the pump for the irrigation of the 2500 unit below the town will be installed. Warmers in the Bonanza district are optimistic over their new prospects for irrigation, which will make them independent of the dry seasons.

### Oregon Boy Says Kaiser Is Having Heavy Loss in Men

The Kaiser is losing so many men that he needs defeat before many months according to a letter from Stephen Z. Schollard, one of the Third Oregon boys in France, to his cousin, Mrs. Guy O'Melveny, daughter of Judge Thomas Pitts Gerald. The letter in full is as follows: American Ex. Forces, April 23, 1918.

Dear Frances: I was indeed very glad to get your letter and I have intended answering it every day for two months. The most interesting things we are not permitted to write so there is not a great deal left for us to put in a letter.

All week the weather has been rainy, just like Oregon. That is the only thing that has reminded me of home. Everything is years behind the U. S. No large buildings in the cities, the streets are narrow and winding and cobble stones take the place of our pavement. We do see many old cathedrals and places that have a history and are of interest to us, Americans.

A person does not have to be here long to fully realize what a terrible thing this war is and as yet we have not seen the worst of it. The Kaiser is losing lots of men these days which means defeat before many months. We all hope to be back in the States by Christmas, but that is a very uncertain thing. I have not mastered the French language but can understand quite a

- Breakfast (Meatless): Sliced Bananas over Cereal, Top Milk, Brown Bread Toast, Butter, Fried Mush, Maple Syrup, Milk, Coffee, Lunch: Savory Potatoes, Brown Bread, Pickles (home canned), Ginger Bread, Apple Sauce, Dinner: Creamed Peas over Salmon Loaf, Glazed Sweet Potatoes, Pickles (left from lunch), Fresh Graham Rolls (bake today), Home Canned Peaches, Milk Tea (Salsida)
- Amber Corn Gems, Butter, Ginger Bread Pudding (From leftover ginger bread), Milk, Tea
- Breakfast: Stewed Prunes, Graham and Bran Mush, Potato and Rice Balls (From leftovers), Dinner (Prepared in Oven): Liver Hamsteins, Baked Potatoes, Scalloped Corn, Graham Bread, Relish (home made), Lemon Honey Custard, Raisin Bread, Tea
- Lunch: Baked Macaroni and Cheese, Stewed Tomatoes, Rye Bread, Cocoa, Graham Crackers
- Recipes: Savory Potatoes—Six onions and enough potatoes, raw, peeled, and diced) to make four cups, 1 cup canned tomatoes, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 cup milk or water, salt and pepper and butter substitute.
