**Quality Is Lacking in Open Market Supply At North Portland**

PORTLAND, May 21.—That Seattle packers are not aiding the government in conserving freight cars and that the Pacific northwest live stock industry is not supported, is indicated by the continued liberal shipments of hogs being made from North Dakota, while a big bunch of sheep was loaded from the same territory during the last 24 hours. Just why it is necessary for Seattle interests to secure middle west hogs, and sheep when Portland packers get their requirements at home is a mystery to the trade in general.  
Considering the quality of average arrivals of livestock at North Portland over Sunday, there was a steady tone generally for supplies. Slight increase in offerings of hogs was shown as compared with last Monday but sales were made around former values as far as quality was concerned.

Baker Ham and Cheese.

Potatoes Scalloped with Cheese.

**Potato and Peanut Loaf.**  
1 cup mashed potatoes.  
1 cup peanut butter.  
1 egg.  
2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley.  
2 teaspoons salt.  
2 teaspoons grated onion.  
1-2 teaspoon grated nutmeg.  
1-2 teaspoon paprika.  
To the hot mashed potatoes add the peanut butter, well beaten egg and other ingredients. Put in a greased baking pan and bake in a hot oven 25 to 40 minutes.

**Baker Soy Beans.**  
2 1/2 cups soy beans.  
1-4 cup molasses.  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil.  
Salt.  
Pepper.  
Soak beans in cold water 12 hours. Drain, cover with water, and simmer until soft. Place layer of beans in casserole then some of the molasses and oil and seasoning. Repeat layers until the dish is full. Bake two hours.
