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U. S. INCREASED PATROL HINDERS SUB ACTIVITY

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The American navy is increasing its patrol force in European waters, the department today announced.

Increased patrol is one of the factors in the recent decreased submarine sinkings. The navy's aircraft contingent is also being augmented and ship forces enlarged.

The department declared the submarine situation has improved, but the department is loath to make optimistic predictions lest the people relax and the submarine campaign burst forth with renewed vigor.

It is declared there is reason to believe that Germany has superabundant reserves of unusual power and cruising radius.
