Cryder of the Umatilla National forest, who recently returned from a tour of the tract, range conditions are somewhat unfavorable, as there has been less water in the mountains than he expected, and the cold weather has kept the grass back. The water is also lower than usual.

Weather Cold at Ukiah.
E. L. Thrasher says the city today from Ukiah and reports the weather freezing, and told of a cake of ice which formed on a 10-pound pail of water last night. He says that section is much in need of warm weather and rain.

Re-seeding Barley.

Bishop Robert Paddock, Episcopal bishop for eastern Oregon, is coming from Hood River with a number of the clergy of the district, Friday, for a short conference before the bishop leaves for war work in France. There will probably be a confirmation, and other sacraments, although it is not known certainly as yet, as the bishop's length of stay has not been learned.

Sam Crowner Seriously Ill.
Sam Crowner, former Pendleton man, is so seriously ill in Portland following a recent success operation, that he is expected to live only a few hours, according to a message received by E. L. Thrasher, a brother-in-law of Ukiah, who came in to take the train for Portland this morning. Mr. Crowner lived in and around Pendleton for about 25 years.

Colored Bootlegger Pays.
Ernest Allen, colored janitor of the city, decided to pay a fine of \$50 yesterday rather than go to trial for bootlegging. He was caught Saturday evening in one of the office buildings of the city, which he had been using as a distributing point for his beverages, and pleaded guilty to the charge of bootlegging. He was brought into the city recorder's court by Chief of Police Roberts.

Expects Transfer to Minneapolis.
Mr. Wm. Dum received a letter yesterday from his son, Harold, who is at Camp Lewis, in which he states that his troop is expecting soon to be transferred to Minneapolis. Speaking of the army, Harold says he has not yet attained the rank of general, but enjoys very much being in the ranks as a private. The only thing troubling them is when they will get a chance to go to France.

Home Guard Invited to Dance.
The Girls Honor Guard of Tutuilla have extended a general invitation to the members of the Pendleton Home Guard to attend the dance to be given at Hillside Home on Tutuilla this evening. This evening is regular drill night for the guards and Captain Lee Drake states that they will be dismissed early to give all an opportunity to attend. The dance is given for the benefit of the Red Cross and a large attendance is anticipated.

Not For Retailers.
The President by a proclamation signed May 14, 1918, requires all individuals, partnerships, associations and corporations, except those specifically exempted by the food control act, engaged in the importation, manufacture, storage and distribution of tools, utensils, implements, machinery and certain other farm equipment to secure Federal licenses not later than June 20, 1918. It is not understood the provisions of the new regulation apply to retail dealers. Therefore it will not be effective in Pendleton.

Alaskan Guests Leave.
Bishop and Mrs. E. T. Rowe, who have been the guests of Rev. and Mrs. Alfred Lockwood, at the Episcopal rectory, since Saturday evening left this morning for Seattle, where they will make a short stay. They will probably leave soon after to return to Alaska, where the bishop has been laboring for the past 23 years. Bishop Rowe made two interesting talks at the Sunday services at the Church of the Redeemer, during which he spoke of the early missionary work in Alaska, with which he was associated before the gold rush at the end of the century. He told of experiences before the railroad came, when the population was chiefly Indian and Eskimo and when he was the first Episcopal bishop in that country.
