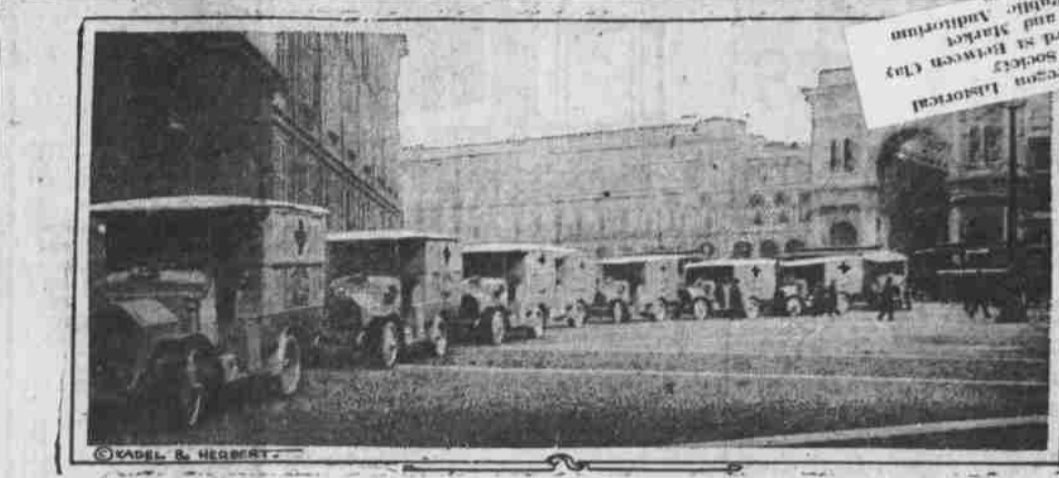

OFFENSIVE MAY STRIKE YANKS IN PICARDY

Indications of Extreme Transport Activity Behind Enemy Lines.

AIRMEN ACTIVE AND GUNS PAUSE

Boche Fliers Try Desperately to Photograph American Positions.

WITH THE AMERICANS IN PICARDY, May 22.—Enemy methods of marked aerial activity with marked artillery quietude, indicate that the offensive's resumption may strike here.

The Germans have not dug in extensively in the Cantigny and Mont Didier region, possibly indicating that they do not plan to establish a line there, but will try to push farther.

Boche aviators are taking desperate chances trying to cross the line to observe tell-tale dust clouds along American roads and to photograph towns and positions.

Lazy summer weather prevails. Between the Somme and Arras, German artillery seems to have increased slightly. The allied front lines being considerably pounded in these sectors, while battered areas are targets for the heavies.

HOLLAND REJECTS U. S. EXPLANATION

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Answering America's reply regarding Dutch ship seizures, the Dutch government said American explanations were insufficient and Holland invites further correspondence.

OFFICIAL COUNTS NOW LEAD HOFF, WILLIAMS, JOHNS, HORNIBROOK

PORTLAND, May 22.—Complete returns from 26 counties give Hoff leading Ryan for treasurer by 59 votes. Williams is leading Miller for public service commissioner by 329. Johns has apparently clinched the judgeship.

11 DEAD FROM IOWA TORNADO; 60 INJURED

DES MOINES, May 22.—Eleven dead, 60 injured and high property damage resulted from a tornado that struck three central Iowa towns. Seven were dead at Boone, two at Newton and one at Denison.
