GERMAN COMMANDER BETRAYS 4 U-BOATS

Captured, He Told British About Them, and All Were Destroyed.

NEW YORK, May 29.—The first authoritative explanation of Premier Lloyd George's announcement, made some time ago, that five German U boats were sunk in one day off the north coast of Ireland was given yesterday by Louis Tracy, the novelist, to a large audience at the American Artists' Exhibit for the Blind War Relief Fund in the Anderson Galleries.

Mr. Tracy, who is associated with the British War Mission in this country, said:

"A British submarine was lying on the surface off the coast of Ireland. Suddenly appeared, not more than forty feet away, the periscopes of a German U boat. The British craft immediately fired and disabled the U boat, so that the British captured her, her commanding officer and men. The commander was taken aboard the British submarine, where he was treated well, but seemed very ill at ease and kept taking out his watch.

"Finally he informed the British commander that there were four other German U boats in the vicinity. The British commander immediately communicated with his station by wireless, and destroyers were rushed toward the spot where the German commander indicated the German U boats might be. As a result every one of the four remaining U boats was destroyed, marking the largest single bag of German submarines during the war."

HOUSEHOLD

Barley Pastry.
Very good pie crust can be made with all-barley flour or using one-half barley and one-half wheat flour. The first recipe is especially good for a one-crust pie.

Pie Crust 1.
1 cup barley flour,
2 2-3 tablespoons fat,
1-8 teaspoon salt,
Cold water.

Pie Crust 2.
1-2 cup barley flour,
1-8 teaspoon salt,
2 2-3 tablespoons fat,
1-2 cup white flour,
1-4 teaspoon baking powder,
Cold water,
Two crusts.

Barley Cakes and Cookies.
It is not necessary to go without cake when such delicious products can be made that use no wheat flour and but little sugar. In these recipes the housekeeper if she prefers can use cream of tartar with baking soda in the usual proportions in place of baking powder.

Chocolate Cake.
2 cups barley flour,
1-4 cup fat,
1-4 teaspoon salt,
2 squares chocolate,
1-2 cup milk,
4 teaspoons baking powder,
2 tablespoons brown sugar,
1 cup corn sirup,
2 eggs, whites and yolks, beaten separately.

Sponge Cake.
1 1-2 cups barley flour,
4 eggs,
1 tablespoon lemon juice,
1-2 cups corn sirup,
1-4 teaspoon salt,
2 teaspoons baking powder.

Fruit Cake.
3 1-4 cups barley flour,
1-4 cup fat,
3 tablespoons molasses,
1-2 cup chopped raisins,
1-4 teaspoon cinnamon,
1-2 cup chopped nuts,
1-2 cup corn sirup,
1-4 teaspoon soda,
1 teaspoon baking powder,
1-4 teaspoon allspice,
1-4 teaspoon cloves,
1-8 cup citron.
Bake 1 hour and 10 minutes. Keeps moist and very good.
