Officials declare that calls for the time were so numerous that the company was necessary to conserve time and effort. The elimination of this accommodation will mean the improvement of general service, it is said, for it was found to work out that way in Eastern cities where the rule was made effective several months ago.

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OVER THE NORTHWEST

New Warehouses Needed.

HOOD RIVER, June 6.—To handle the fruit of the Apple Growers Association the coming fall, on account of the large crop and the expected car shortage, according to Executive Manager A. W. Stone, it will be necessary to erect new warehouses at Odell and Van Horn. The estimated cost of the improvements reaching \$25,000. The co-operative shipping concern already has large receiving plants at the two stations of the Mount Hood Railroad company.

Forest Fire Menace Big.

BAKER, Or., June 6.—The unusually dry spring has made conditions very bad for forest fires this season and extra precautions are being taken by timber owners of this section to protect their holdings during the fire season. While no direct threats have been made recently, the effort several weeks ago to destroy the local lumber plants, in which the Elumpter Valley Railway machine works were burned, have caused fear and unrest among the timber owners. W. W. W. or other agitators take advantage of the condition of the forests to work damage by setting forest fires.

Spokane Grocers Warned.

SPOKANE, June 6.—"Large grocery stores whose licenses are regulated by the food administration and which are charging higher prices than are warranted by the market are sanctioned by the administration may have their licenses revoked," said C. E. Bender, chairman of the price interpreting board of the administration, today.

Liberty Bonds Above Par.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 6.—Liberty bonds of the 3-1/2 per cent variety are worth more in Spokane today than in New York. This is construed to indicate that Spokane men of means are buying them for investment. These bonds sold on the Spokane stock exchange today at par, which is higher than ever before in their history. They then went up and closed strong at \$109.25 bid with nothing offered; \$109.50 offered at that price.

President Hotel Honored.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 6.—R. D. Hetzel, former director of the Oregon Agricultural college extension service and now president of the New Hampshire agricultural college, will receive the doctor of laws degree from Dartmouth. In a letter to W. A. Jensen, executive secretary, President Hetzel announces the close of the college year and the early beginning of training courses for enrolled men.

Star Gazers Find Nugget.

BAKER, Or., June 6.—While on a trip to the mountains today astronomer, W. M. Conrad of the naval observatory party here for the eclipse, as they were crossing the old Nelson placers, north of the city, picked up a gold nugget which was later found to be worth \$2.20.

Horse Meat for Red Cross.

GREAT FALLS, June 6.—Major A. J. Foush today announced that at the city market in the City Market building Saturday next the city would offer for sale horse meat at from 7 to 12 cents per pound. The horse was seven years old, weighed 1300 pounds and was given to the mayor by a citizen of Great Falls. All the receipts above actual expenses will be given the local chapter of the Red Cross.

Klamath Burden Shifted.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 6.—Ratifying their decision made at a previous election several months ago members of the Klamath Water Users' Association decided at the annual meeting by an almost unanimous vote on the adoption of the contract wherein the Klamath Irrigation district, a public corporation, will assume the obligation to the United States for the construction and drainage charges heretofore borne by the Water Users' Association. The construction charges amount to \$1,263,026.26.

Drainage Project Is Big.

EUGENE, Ore., June 6.—Ralph Schoedel, who has been interested in the building of a \$300,000 irrigation system for the reclamation of 20,000 acres of land in the Ochoco irrigation district, near Prineville, is representing financial interests who are backing a project west and north of Eugene, along the Willamette river, for the irrigation of between 30,000 and 40,000 acres of land, according to an announcement made here Monday.

Timbers Crush Foreman.

COLFAX, June 6.—Henry Fitzgerald, well-known resident of St. John, Wash., and a Whitman county road foreman, was instantly killed at St. John Monday evening.

Liquor Men Get Tebato.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 5.—By a ruling of the supreme court today in a suit brought against the state by the Olympia Brewing Company, the legislature next winter will have to appropriate approximately \$5000 in liquor dealers' put out of business by the prohibition law, which went into effect January 1, 1914.

Hatchery to Be Enlarged.

PORTLAND, June 6.—E. E. Clanton, master fish warden, left Portland yesterday to arrange for enlargements and improvements of the Klamath hatchery. He plans to spend six or seven thousand dollars enlarging the hatchery and feeding grounds. A large tract of land for the feeding ground has been condemned at Olney and work on the project will start immediately.

Parsons on French Front.

PORTLAND, June 6.—L. E. Parsons is not in the despatch chain. On the contrary, he is very much engaged in fighting the Hun in the gas service of the army in France. Recently local exemption board No. 3 reported that Mr. Parsons was one of those who had not returned his questionnaire and that he must be listed as a deserter. A letter from Mr. Parsons received in Portland yesterday says he left the city July 2, 1917, under instructions of the chief of engineers, U. S. Army, and that he has been in France with the American expeditionary force since August, 1917, for more than six months of that time in the zone of advance.

Age Discrepancy Appears.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 6.—Claiming he was 21 last month but really 25 as shown by a marriage certificate, H. C. Piny was today allowed to enlist at once and this he has promised to do. He has three children, one a babe a few months. Authorities contend his family will be better cared for with Piny in the army than out.

Prize Rider Sentenced.

BAKER, June 6.—Fritz Rader, convicted at Canyon City last evening for the killing of E. E. McCue, near Long Creek early this spring, was today sentenced by Judge Biggs to the Penitentiary for a term of 6 to 18 years and fined \$1000. His father, rated as the wealthiest man in Grant county, employs the best legal talent available and will spend money unhesitatingly to save his son from a prison term, notice of appeal to the supreme court being given. Rader killed McCue after a quarrel relative to pasture land owned by the Raders and used by McCue. He pleaded self-defense, claiming he shot only when McCue attacked him.

Wife Beater Dodges Lash.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—Four women, asked by a police judge here to decide whether a convicted wife-beater should be whipped or imprisoned, today decided against the lash.

Marshfield, Or., June 6.—The tremendous demand for ship knees is keeping Coast and Curry county workers busy, than workers at shipyards. J. W. Who he was was not given out to the public officials, but it was no one wanted for a crime. People had seen a man answering the description of Baldwin and a well-organized chase was instituted.

Neighbors' Dispute Ends in Court.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 6.—With a heavy docket before it, the Union county circuit court for the June term opened today. Judge Knowles presiding. The first case called was that against Mrs. Rymerson, a prominent woman charged with disturbing the peace following a dispute with a neighbor.

More French Ships Planned.

TACOMA, Wash., June 4.—Construction of some 10 to 15 wooden vessels for the French government will be undertaken at the Foundation Company's yards here. That announcement was made by Frank W. Walker, representative of the French government, and Bayly Hopkins, manager of the yard, when the Royce, third wooden ship launched at the plant, took the water, and the Ger-velles launched a month ago made its trial run.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 4.—For the first time in the history of interstate track and field athletics on the Pacific coast the hurling of the hand grenade will be a regularly scheduled event. The Western Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association has drafted rules to govern the competition, which will be one of the standard events of the outdoor conference meets to be held here June 5.

Shoup's induction into the army will materially weaken the Portland club's pitching staff. Shoup was secured from the Cleveland Americans this spring and pitched a good brand of ball for the Buckaroos. He was without a doubt the best prospect Manager Fisher had in the hurling department.
