The shipment contains hospital supplies, surgical dressings, refugee garments and layettes, Junior Red Cross work and knitted garments. There are five cases of sweaters alone, containing 400 garments, which

is the country's quota for the period ending August 1.

A date for the meeting will be set as soon as possible.

Just Out of the Path.

Pendleton is just out of the path of the total eclipse that is billed for next Saturday afternoon. The effect of the eclipse will be very plain in Pendleton but to reach the area of the total eclipse a large number of Pendleton people are planning to go a short distance south of town. The line marking between the total and partial eclipse is said to be about half way between Pendleton and Pilot Rock, while Ukiah is approximately in the center of total area. The total eclipse will cover a strip 60 miles wide extending across the United States from a point in the state of Washington to New Orleans.

SERVICE BADGES FOR SHIPBUILDERS

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The shipping board has announced a plan to issue service badges to workers in vital industries connected with shipbuilding. Gold and silver badges will be given for distinguished service in building ships or making the materials which go into ships. Flags will be given each month to the shipyards making the best records.
