"Mother's Day" Letter

Arrives From France For Mrs. F. C. Searcy

"Mother's mail" in the form of letters written by the soldiers in France to their mothers on Mothers' Day is now arriving here. The following letter from Sgt. William A. Searcy to his mother, Mrs. F. C. Searcy, is of interest:

Somewhere in France, May 14, 1918.

Dear Mother: We have the opportunity to write to our mothers and now you will be sure to get our letters.

I received your letters a few days ago and I sure was glad to hear from you. I also received the home paper which they sent me. There wasn't much news in it but it was good to see it. We are having a good time over here. We were to play another company ball today but they couldn't come over so we will play them tomorrow. I still play my old place in the team. I only caught one game but that is enough to start.

We also box up to the Y. M. C. A. I boxed the other night and had a good time but I am not going to box any more for I am tired of the game and am going to stay out of it for there isn't anything in it and it is better to stay out.

The weather over here is pretty fair. It rains about once or twice a week, then the rest of the time is hot. Its about like our November weather over there. I expect to be home to see the Round-Up after this one, at least I hope so.

We also got paid day before yesterday. I drew a hundred and sixty francs. That's about twenty-seven dollars in our money.

Well, Mother, I don't know anything else to write so I will close for tonight and I hope you will get this letter all O. K.

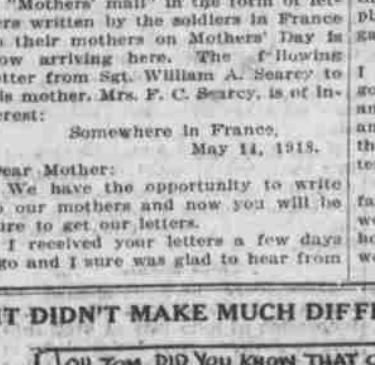

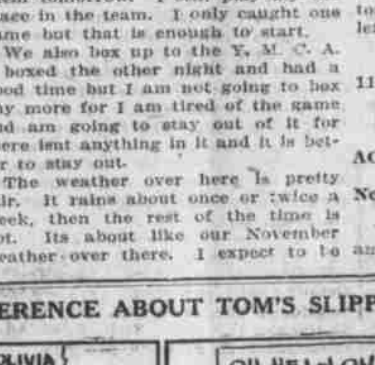

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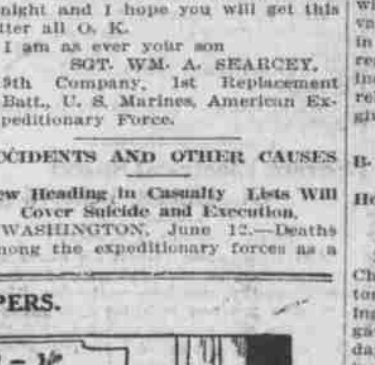
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
