PORTLAND, June 14.—The answer to the oft-repeated assertion that the Willamette valley could not produce first class mutton sheep and lambs, was answered for all time at North Portland during the day, and the valley was the victor.

It happened when Kilmcart & Elliott of Harrisburg sent forward a load of lambs. The animals looked so trim and with tails docked, they captured the buyers to the extent that a quick bid of \$16 was made, and the entire lot of 121 head went at that price, without a dock or a quibble.

### PRESIDENT ENDORSES GRANTING NATIONAL SUFFRAGE TO WOMEN

**Says Measure is Part of Debt of Gratitude for Wartime Usefulness.**

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The President today endorsed the national woman suffrage amendment. He expressed the hope the senate will pass it this session. Suffragists expect the President's endorsement to supply the necessary votes. The President wrote Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the American woman suffrage association and said "the war could not have been fought with out the women nor the war's sacrifices endured. It is high time to pay part of our gratitude debt."

He also said, "We cannot reconstruct world democracy until women are given suffrage."

Mrs. Catt is to transmit the message to the French union for woman suffrage which sent a memorial to Wilson through Mrs. Catt.

The President said: "I have read your message with the greatest interest and welcome the opportunity to say I agree without reservation that a full, sincere democratic reconstruction of the world, for which we are striving and which we are determined to bring about at any cost, will not have been completely or adequately attained until the women are admitted to suffrage."

Asks Action Now.

### WAR BLAMED ON KAISER BY FORMER KRUPP DIRECTOR

GUMBLIGEN, Switzerland, Wednesday, June 13.—Germany was wholly in agreement with Austria-Hungary concerning the ultimatum sent to Serbia at the outbreak of the war, says Dr. Wilhelm Muehlon, former director of Krupp, in further disclosures on the responsibility for the bringing on of the conflict. Emperor William was personally responsible for Germany's participation and forced the German leaders to support his war policy.

Dr. Muehlon, who was head of Krupp at the outbreak of the war, and who recently started Europe with his disclosures, received the correspondent of the United Press at his country place here where he is now living in retirement.
