U. S. SEARCHES PASSENGERS ON HOLLAND LINER

AN ATLANTIC PORT, June 21.—Before they are permitted to land today the 612 passengers on board the Holland-American liner, New Amsterdam, which arrived here yesterday, will have been subjected to the most thorough search of incoming travelers since America entered the war.

Local Woman Has 16 in War on Huns Yet Must Register

One of Fate's grim jests came to light here today, when Mrs. Emil Dohmert and her daughter, Pauline, called at Postmaster Tweedy's office for papers with which to register as alien enemies. Mrs. Dohmert is a Scotch woman and has a 17 year old son, one brother and 14 nephews all in the war against the Hun.

Many of her nephews, who are fighting with the Scotch have been mutilated or wounded, and two have already given up their lives. These two were brothers, sons of Mrs. Dohmert's widowed sister, and one was killed in the first year of the war and the other last October. An older brother of the two boys is now in a hospital. Another of the nephews, the son of Mrs. Dohmert's oldest brother, was sent home with both legs cut off.

The son, 17 year old Ernest Dohmert, is now in training at the Seaman's Barracks, at Puget Sound, Wash., having enlisted from here a few weeks ago. Mrs. Dohmert's brother, Joseph Douglas, is also fighting with the Scotch.

"It's too bad that we must register as enemies," Mrs. Dohmert said, "but it's a part of the price we have to pay for the war, and has to be done." Mrs. Dohmert's husband, who is chief cook at the Pendleton Hotel is a native born German, and has never been naturalized, although he has taken out his first papers.

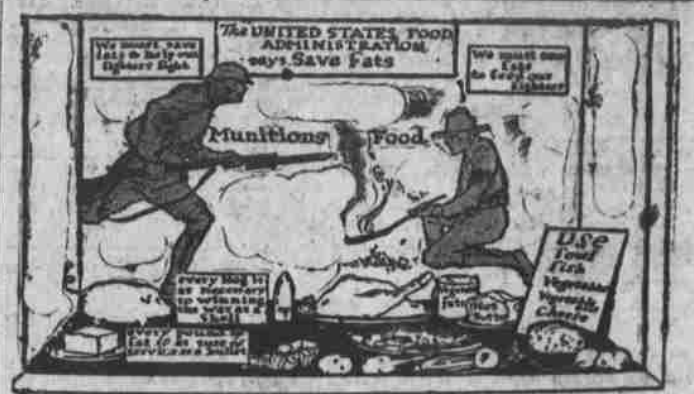
