GERMAN COUNT IS KILLED.

AMSTERDAM, June 18.—Count Keeser Freyding, 22 years old, head of one of the most ancient Bavarian families, has been killed on the western front. The count, despite his comparative youth, was regarded as the leader of the Fatherland party in Bavaria. He won fame as a military man in the Turco-Balkan war when, as a volunteer in the Turkish army, he acted as a dispatch rider under heavy fire along the Tchatalja lines.

In the present war he has figured as a leading cavalry leader on several fronts.

GERMAN BASES IN MEXICO.

Minister of Boches Admits It While Denying Truth of Any Such Rumor.

This statement was made today by Heinrich von Eckhardt, German minister to Mexico, in denying the existence of such bases.
