### THE WATCHWORD IS FIGHT

HERE is significant news of food troubles in Germany and Austria. The reports are so persistent and extreme in nature as to make it certain that the situation in the central empires is bad. It is inevitable there should be great suffering there. Germany and Austria have been in the war for four years. During that time they have been virtually cut off from world commerce. The country is densely populated, and the war has increased the demand for food. Under all these circumstances it requires little imagination to picture Germany and Austria as sorely beset by hunger. The civil population suffers most and the thing has gone on until it is evident the morale is breaking down. Only iron handed autocracy keeps the machine moving. Yet the allies will do well not

to count upon aid through internal troubles in the enemy's camp. The sound policy is to prepare for a long hard war and for thorough defeat of the foe upon the battle field. Through such policy we will be ready for anything that may happen. If the enemy breaks down thus shortening the war so much the better. But the breakdown that we wish and must have is a breakdown that will shatter the kaiser's fighting force. While the foot of the Hun still disgraces the soil of France and Belgium the only watchword for the allies is fight.

### THE FIREBUG IS A TRAITOR

IN ordinary times worry over possible fires is mitigated by the fact insurance is carried. "I should worry" is often the attitude of the man whose property may go up in flames. Now the situation is wholly different. The financial loss is not the chief consideration. The essential thing is that food-stuffs be protected against loss, not so much to protect the farmer or the insurance company but for the sake of the government and the people of those nations that fight for freedom and world decency. We need the food. An attack on the source of food is an attack on the government. It is not arson, it is treason.

### IS YOUR LIFE A HARD ONE?

DO you people at home feel at times that this war has made your life pretty hard? Read what an American correspondent writes about one of our boys who had been doing his duty: "In a little field hospital west of Montdidier I stopped at the bedside of an American boy, one of those victims of the German mustard gas, with which the Huns are making all their present gains. His eyes were matted with yellow pus and he could not see. His face was terribly burned. His lips were swollen and purple. His whole body had been turned the color of an Indian, and portions of it looked like melted

### GEN. GREENE HAS BEEN ORDERED TO THE PHILIPPINES

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Major General Green, Camp Lewis commandant has been promoted to a brigadier general and assigned to command the Philippine department. It is understood Green protested against the order and is enroute to Washington to try to rescind it. Army officers don't understand the reason for the demotion. Army inspectors found his Camp Lewis work highly efficient and his personal record is above reproach.

### Western Union Caught In Clever Scheme for Handling "Messages"

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The government has investigated the Western Union messages at Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Washington and Boston to obtain evidence upholding charges that the Western Union is operating in competition with the post office department by delivering night letters via train service. It is alleged the Western Union has been accepting such messages for wire filing, then delivering by messenger getting ten times as much as the post office for the same service. Five Western Union messengers were arrested. All carried cases filled with night letters and telegrams dated yesterday and prepared as though sent over the wires. It is alleged that thousands of such letters had been delivered in this way between these five large cities. The night letter rate from Washington to Baltimore is 25 cents plus a five cent war tax. The postage on a letter making the trip on the same train is three cents. The post office department says: "Such messages when sent thus constitute a violation of the postal laws and make the guilty party liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment to six months in each case." No action is contemplated against the messengers but the Western Union will be prosecuted. Over fifteen hundred such telegrams were taken. The White House declined to comment but it is presumed this is one of Wilson's answers to President Carrion of the Western Union who refused to accept the labor board decision.

### WAR ON TURKS APPEARS NEAR

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Apparently preliminary to a war declaration against Turkey the state department asked the Spanish embassy to investigate the reported Turkish attack on the American consulate and hospital at Tabriz.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Congress is preparing to demand a new statement of the administration's policy toward Russia. Members favoring America-Japanese cooperation in Siberia will introduce a senate resolution trying to force the President to expose his policy. The intervention sentiment is growing.

### VILLA LEADS BANDIT RAID, KILLS FIFTY

EL PASO, Texas June 21.—Fifty Carranza soldiers were killed by bandits personally led by Francisco Villa, who held up and robbed a train near Santiago-Papaquero, Durango, according to reports received here today.

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### PARIS, June 21.—It is announced that the French advanced slightly northwest of Chateau Thierry and that the French improved their positions north of Faverolles and at Mautermy, taking 20 prisoners.

### LONDON, June 21.—Halg reported successful Ploegry raids and the repulse of a local German attempt in Flanders, the British capturing prisoners.

### "During the night we captured a few prisoners and machine-guns inflicting many enemy casualties in raids and patrol encounters at Aveluy wood, near Rebuterne, and astride the Scarpe. Several hostile attempts to recapture the ground gained by us yesterday northwest of Merris were repulsed."

### French in Canada Are Now Enlisting Freely

BOSTON, June 19.—French Canadians, who recently fought the draft and refused to enlist, are now flocking to the colors in the provinces, according to Capt. J. L. Breaker of the Royal Engineers, who returned on recruiting duty here today after visiting several Canadian training camps. Thousands of French-Canadians were being drilled, and large contingents were arriving daily. The change in front, Capt. Breaker said, was largely due to the influence of the Archbishop of Quebec.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The war department bill, changing draft ages will be presented this session, said Kahn, republican member of the house military committee. Kahn is strong against lowering the age below 21 and favors 21 to 45.
